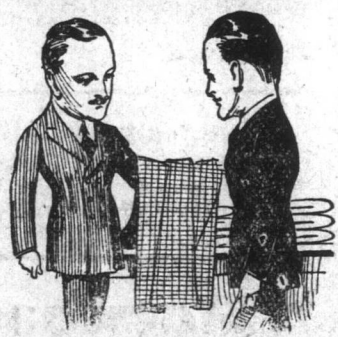

In the Realms of Sport

LAST NIGHT'S FOOTBALL.

C.L.B. Defeat Star.

The third game of the regular tie-up fixtures was played last night, between the Star and C.L.B., and resulted in a win for the latter by one goal to nil. The game began about seven o'clock and immediately the teams got down to serious business, with the result that a hard game was played. For the first few minutes play was confined to centre field, and after this for a time it was from end to end. After about ten minutes the C.L.B. were awarded a free kick, just outside the penalty area, and it was kicked by Hennebury; the ball was stopped, but before it was cleared, Chafe banged it in the net, for the balance of the first period, with the win in their favor. The Star pressed their opponents' goal but were unable to score, although at times they came within an ace of doing so. Without leaving the field, the teams changed over for the second period, and here was seen a repetition of the first period, both teams exerting every effort to score, and keeping up the pace right through. Several determined efforts to score were made, but it was not possible to beat the defence lines, and the full time whistle sounded with the C.L.B. having a one goal lead over the Star. Mr. T. Delahunty was referee.

CITY TEAM BEING SELECTED.

The committee of the Newfoundland Football League, appointed to arrange games with the naval visitors are now forming the city team, and the dates of the games will be announced after consultation, with the officers of the ships. The games are in aid of the Permanent Marine Disaster Fund and the G.W.V.A. Relief Fund. The city team will necessarily have to be the best obtainable, as the naval teams are said to be strong aggregations.

TELEGRAM ROAD RACE ENTRIES.

Entry No. 2.

George Crane, a C.L.B. boy, is the third long distance runner to enter for the Telegram Road Race. Crane, who is sixteen years of age, broke in to the long distance running game this year, and on his initial appearance in the race for the C.L.B. Trophy, held in July last, he was well up with the leaders after the greatest part of the course had been covered, when he was forced to drop out, owing to suffering from cramps. Crane has all the requirements of a runner, and with additional practice, he has secured the necessary endurance to cover the long grind. The many friends of Crane feel confident that he will capture one of the prizes.

Entry No. 4.

Jake Ralph, another C.L.B. boy, is the fourth runner to enter the Telegram Road Race. Ralph is well known as a long distance runner, and with the previous experience gained he is bound to be well up to the front on Wednesday next. During the past three years he has made a creditable showing in all races. Last year he finished fourth in the race for the Telegram Trophy, in 62min. 15sec. well inside the time limit for the silver medal. This year he hopes to improve his position.

Entry No. 5.

George Hamlyn, a new comer, has sent in his entry, and will run under the colors of the Newfoundland Highlanders. It is predicted by those familiar with him that Hamlyn, with No. 5 pinned on his back, will need close watching in the race, as he is considered to be a real road horse. Hamlyn made his first appearance in the 3 mile turf race at the Highland Games on Wednesday last, and made a good impression.

Entry No. 6.

Graham Kelly, another of our most promising long distance runners has sent in his entry for the Telegram Road Race. Kelly finished sixth in the race last year, and was awarded a silver medal for covering the course under the specified time limit. He has undergone several months' training for the approaching race and feels confident that he can improve his last year's time by several minutes. Kelly is 20 years of age and covered the course last year in 64 minutes and 15 seconds.

REPUTED BOXER ON BOARD FLAGSHIP HOOD.

King is 21 years of age and he has fought 320 battles in the squad ring. He is acting as the Admiral's cabin-man, and is a favorite with everybody on board. No doubt a boxing competition will be arranged between the ships before they sail, and give the local boxing enthusiasts a chance to see this boy King in action.

MAKING GOOD TIME.

O'Toole and Linsgar, the favorites in the 10 Mile Road Race, are fast getting licked into shape for the long grind. Yesterday afternoon O'Toole covered 7 miles of the course in 37 minutes and 35 seconds, 58 seconds quicker than his last years winning time, and felt quite fresh at the finish. Linsgar also had a hike over the same route, and was but twenty seconds slower than O'Toole. Linsgar ran over a dark road, and his performance is very creditable. Judging by the above the race promises to be neck and neck all the way, with a thrilling finish round two laps of the field. Both runners are very evenly matched, and much even money betting is taking place as a result.
