Annual Meeting

ST. THOMAS'S CHURCH.

The annual Easter meeting of St. Thomas's Parish was held in Canon Wood Hall last night, after evening prayers, the Rector, Rev. J. B. Elliot, presiding. Despite the inclemency of the weather quite a good gathering was present—some of the fair sex blurring the elements and putting in an appearance, too. The Rector opened the meeting with prayer, after which the Secretary of the Select Vestry, F. M. Stirling, read the minutes of the last annual meeting, which were confirmed. The Rector then submitted his report of the spiritual work of the Parish during the past year, that showed, so far as can be humbly judged, advancement in all parochial activities.

The Financial Warden, Hon. R. Watson, presented his report for the year. The accounts showed the church finances to be eminently satisfactory. There was an increase in the number of subscribers and in at least two instances the collections were the largest on record. A reserve fund for repairs had been established, in addition to which there was a substantial balance to the credit of the Church. Receipts from all sources amounted to \$27,025.29, of which \$20,463.07 stood for parochial requirements and \$6,562.22 for Missions and other extra-parochial purposes, each showing an increase as compared with the preceding year.

At the request of the Rector, the Hon. Tasker Cook again agreed to act as Rector's Warden, and the Hon. R. Watson was for the 11th consecutive year unanimously elected People's Warden. There was general regret in the Parish recently when it became known that through rather indifferent health, the Hon. Mr. Watson will be obliged to relinquish his duties as Warden at this meeting, but at the urgent request of the Vestry and on the promise that they would lighten the work all they could for him, he agreed to accept the office for another year. Mr. Watson's services to St. Thomas's Church have been very great and are much appreciated by the congregation. He was first elected People's Warden about twenty-eight years ago, when he served for five years. He was again elected ten years ago, and has held the office ever since, making a total of fifteen years as People's Warden.

The election of the Select Vestry resulted as follows:—(The Rector and Wardens ex officio) Sir M. G. Winter, C.B.E., Hon. W. S. Monroe, H. W. LeMessurier, C.M.G., C. E. Hunt, F. M. Stirling, L. Colley, R. R. Wood, G. H. Cook, A. G. Carnell, R. G. MacDonald, J. J. Coaker, Wm. Churchill.

Reports were received and adopted from the following parish organizations:—Sunday Schools, Llewellyn Club, Women's Association, W. H. M. S. Brotherhood of St. Andrew's, St. Margaret's Guild, Young Women's Bible Class and Girls' Club, Dunfield Club and Bible Class, Women's Bible Class, Cartwright Mission Circle, Bell Ringers' Association, General Protestant Industrial Society and Cemetery Committee.

The following Committees, etc. were re-appointed: Auditors, Hon. W. S. Monroe and F. C. Berteau, I.S.O.; Cemetery Committee, E. S. Pineson, E. Laurence, J. C. Oke, F. Burcell and R. Dowden; Representatives to Protestant Industrial Society, the Rector, G. H. Cook and F. Bursell.

A vote of thanks, proposed by Hon. R. Watson and seconded by A. G. Carnell, was heartily tendered to all Church workers, through whose efforts, in small measure, the efficient state of the Parish is due.

The question of installing a broadcasting apparatus in the Church was discussed, and a small committee was appointed to enquire into the matter and report at a later date to the Select Vestry. This meeting, adjourned with the singing of the Doxology and the pronouncing of the Benediction by the Rector.

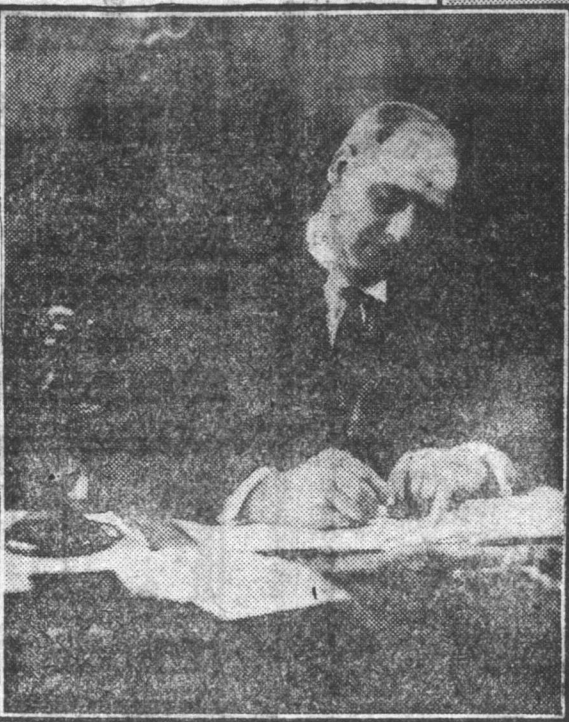
Successful Entertainment at Glovertown

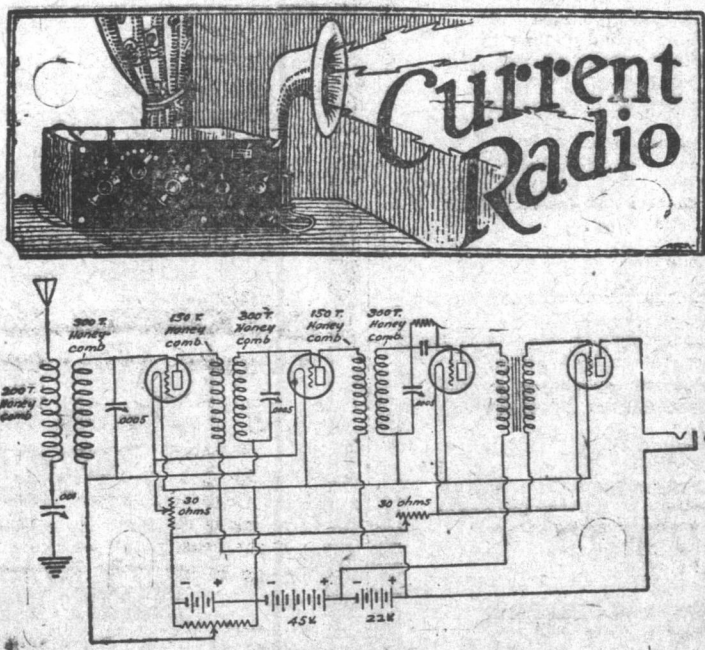

Tuning in Foreign Broadcasting Stations

There are a number of foreign broadcasting stations operating on wave lengths from 1,000 to 3,000 meters. The tendency of foreign engineers is to gradually increase the wave lengths used in new and experimental stations instead of going down to the shorter waves as we do here in America.

In Belgium station BAY operates on 1,100 meters, broadcasting regularly. Kholby, Prague and Prunn in Czechoslovakia broadcast on 1,100 and 1,800 and 1,750 meters respectively. Station OXE at Lyngby, Denmark can be found on 2,400 meters. No less than six stations in France operate in this band between 1,000 and 3,000 meters. Two stations in Germany, three in Italy, one in Yugoslavia, seven in Hol-

tion. We hope, shortly, to be able to run a story on the completed receiver. The above circuit is merely a suggestion as to one way in which this reception can possibly be accomplished.

This set whose circuit we are showing includes two stages of tuned radio frequency amplification, detector and one stage of audio amplification. We are not utilizing any form of Hazeltine neutrotron neutralizer but are using a potentiometer to prevent oscillations in the radio amplifier tubes. On wave lengths above 1,000 meters there is nothing gained by using a capacity neutralization scheme, the potentiometer method being entirely satisfactory.

For the secondary coils marked "a" in the diagram, we suggest 300 turn honeycomb coils. These coils when shunted by a condenser having a capacity of .00025 mfd will have a tuning range from 1,000 to 3,000 meters. A large condenser (48 plates) can be used, of course, and will be of no particular disadvantage. Due to interference from ships stations operating on the 800 and 962 meter waves, it is highly desirable that the primary circuit of the first transformer be tuned and also have some provision whereby the coupling between the primary and secondary coils be variable.
