Body of Bessie Barrett Found in Quidi Vidi Lake

The body of Bessie Barrett, the 18-year-old girl reported missing from her home on King's Bridge Rd. since Sunday, Oct. 12th, was discovered yesterday afternoon at the head of Quidi Vidi Lake. As reported previously in the Telegram, the girl left the home of her employer, Mrs. Thomas Smyth on Sunday last, without putting on a hat or intimating where she was going. Neither Mr. or Mrs. Smyth thought anything of the matter for the time but became alarmed when she did not return at the usual hour and reported the matter to the police. During the week many enquiries were made but nothing was learned that would give a clue to the searchers until yesterday when the police were informed that a person answering to the description of the missing girl had been seen in the vicinity of Quidi Vidi Lake. Sergeant Simmons, Constables Peter Lee, R. Pittman, and J. Walsh immediately set out to make a search in this vicinity, and made their gruesome find about one o'clock. The body was found in about three feet of water just a short distance from where Renne's River enters the lake. On being conveyed to the morgue a postmortem examination was held on the body by Dr. Anderson and death was pronounced due to drowning. Undertaker Myrick took charge of the remains.

The girl's father is dead, but her mother and sisters are now living in Halifax, where they went some years ago from the West Coast, their former home. It was only on Saturday last that a letter came from her people, asking Bessie to go up to them.

JOHANNA DONNELLY KING

THOMAS J. DONOHUE

By the last American mail Mrs. Bridget Simmonds of Lime Street, of this city, received word of the death of her brother, Thomas J. Donohue, in Boston. The deceased, who was a son of the late Daniel Donohue, left here many years ago and settled in the States, and the following obituary taken from a Boston Journal indicates how largely he was esteemed in the place of his adoption.

Thomas J. Donohue, one of the best known undertakers in this city, died at his home, 331 Smith street, late last night, after an illness of about a week. He was 53 years old.

Although Mr. Donohue had been ill for some days, his death came suddenly, as he was able to sit up for breakfast at his home yesterday morning. Shortly afterward, however, he suffered a relapse, and sank rapidly until his death.

Mr. Donohue for many years prior to establishing his own business was associated with the late Horace B. Knowles in the undertaking firm of Horace B. Knowles and Sons for 25 years.

About 16 years ago, however, he left the Knowles firm to form his own business, and was located for some time on North Main street. Later, however, he moved to his present location on Smith Street.

Mr. Donohue never married. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Mary E. Schindhelm of East Boston and Mrs. Bridget Simmonds of St. John's, N.F., and a brother, Jeremiah, of the latter place. He was born in Newfoundland, but came here at the age of 16. He was a member of Providence Lodge of Elks.
