Madrid, Oct. 2.—A despatch from the Town of Escurial, 24 miles north-west of this City, announces that the celebrated Monastery of the Escurial was struck by lightning this evening. The building was quickly on fire, and so rapid was the devouring element that the dome and tower of the magnificent edifice have already fallen. The Royal Palace, with its splendid library of books and paintings, and rare and costly manuscripts, is now in fiames. At the date of this despatch there is apparently little hope of saving from destruction the Mausoleum as well from destruction the Mausoleum as well as the summer residence of the Spanish Kings. A brigade of engineers, fully equipped with materials for use in such emergencies, has left Madrid for the Escapical

London, Oct. 2 .- A terrible accident happened this morning to a passenge train from this city to Edinburgh. While running at a very rapid speed it came in collision, near Kirtle Bridge, with a freight train, causing the instant death of nine persons. Many others are in-jured, and it is feared several of them will die. But few details are received. All despatches agree in stating that the train was behind time, and was running at a furious rate to make it up. The scene of the disaster is not far from Carlisle, the capital of Cumberland County, and a train has been sent from the town to bring in the dead and wounded.
