For a time, the contractors, The James-Mitchell Construction company, seemed to make fair progress, but during the last month it appears that practically no progress has been made.

The lack of progress in construction of the sewer was before the council a short time ago, and after some discussion, the matter was referred to the city engineer.

This action was taken at the request of City Engineer J. T. Child, but the council intimated that they expected him to take such action as would speedily forward the construction of the big sewer.

Inspection of the work, however, seems to show that very little has been accomplished since that time, and that Calgary may have to wait much longer for the big sewer which is badly needed, unless some stringent measures are taken at once to force the work along.

Liverpool cables were 5-8 to 7-8 cent higher, and a firm tone on the semi-failure of crops in the British Isles and Northwestern Europe. Americans were generally higher at opening, continuing steady to higher, the entire session.

Winnipeg October opened 1-4 higher, December and May lower after selling.

Chicago Wheat

Chicago, Aug. 28.—Charters of vessel room here today to load more than a million bushels of wheat for Buffalo, intended to give the cereal strength.

Although the final tone was easy, the market closed a shade to 3-8 to 1-2 above last night. Corn finished a sixteenth to 3-8 up. Oats varied from a shade off to 1-8 advance.

Aggressive action by short sellers of wheat started as soon as the market showed a disposition for an uptick, and the bulls had the advantage most of the time and took profit on a large scale during the last hour.

Freights kept foreigners out of the buying side of the market. The gains were relatively small for September, as important liquidation sales by long holders acted as a drag.

December contracts swung from 94 to 1-4 to 95 5-8, and in the end was 1-4 net higher at 94 5-8.

Car scarcity complaints by country dealers who have old stock to ship, made the corn market firm. The trade ignored the fine weather for maturing the new crops.

September ranged from 73 1-4 to 74 3-4, closing steady at 73 7-8, a 3-8 advance. Cash grades were in good demand.

In the oats crowd, shorts covered freely but longs realized in a liberal way, so that in the end prices showed little difference. Outside limits touched for September were 32 5-8 and 33 1-2 and 33 1-2 to 5-8.

New York Stocks

New York, Aug. 28.—The most conspicuous feature of today's market was its underlying strength in the face of persistent and heavy selling. Pressure centered largely around Reading and United States Steel, but that did not prevent the later from establishing its best price of the year.

Dealings in the stocks named overshadowed all others in volume, 575 Harriman and Hill issues as well as copper and other speculative issues showing neglect. In the late trading business fell away with frequent periods of utter stagnation, but another selling movement ensued shortly before the close which sent many issues a point or more under the preceding day's final quotations.

The Interstate Commerce commission is soon to render an important decision. The roads in the Canadian group were under restraint owing to advances from Canada of government opposition to the C.P.R. proposed re-trace. L. & N., and A. C. L. were strong on light dealings in connection with the approaching meeting of the directors of the first road named, at which developments favorable to shareholders are expected.

Rock Island, Erie, first preferred, 60-61, and other stocks of copper miscellaneous character shared in the early rise, only to fall back towards the close.

London was a purchaser here on balance, taking moderate amounts of Steel Amalgamated and U. P. Firms were marked the day in Paris with activity and strength in Berlin. Local banks suffered another decline of cash with a \$1,300,000 gold shipment to Canada. A slight surfering of long maturities was reported.
