A preliminary hearing was given to another liquor case in the Police Court yesterday. Thomas J. Cook was the supposed culprit. He is said to have sold some hard cider to Alfred Hall on the Western Fair ground. Mr. Love, who represented Cook, was not prepared to go on with the case; he had not been fully instructed in the defense, Magistrate Parke, however, decided to hear the evidence for the prosecution. He had bought the cider in question (a bottle of which was produced) from the defendant on the Saturday preceding the fair, and had given a sample of it to Inspector Henderson on the following Thursday. He was told when purchasing that the cider was perfectly fresh. The sample offered the court he did not think was a fair one as it had been taken from the dregs of the keg. Prof. Harrison, who had analyzed the cider in question, said that it contained 5.00 per cent, of alcohol by volume. In 135 samples of lager beer, which the magistrate accepted as a standard of intoxicant, he had found 4.25 per cent. of alcohol; and in 172 samples tested by the New York Board of Health it had averaged 4.75 per cent. In beer, ale and porter, taken collectively, the amount of alcohol contained was somewhat higher—5.60. Mr. Love wanted to know whether the fact of the cider having stood a few days would tend to increase the alcohol. Mr. Harrison said that this might be so, but the change, if any, would be infinitesimal. The case was adjourned until Thursday in order to give Mr. Love an opportunity to prepare a defense.

JOE HESS' SAD END.

The Big Ex-Pugilist and Temperance Lecturer Dies of Faralysis—Well-Known in Canada. TORONTO, Oct. 6.—The Canadian Tem-

TORONTO, Oct. 6.—The Canadian Temperance League received a dispatch yesterday saying that Joe Hess, the well-known temperance evangelist, died at his home in Clarendon, N. Y., last night. It will be remembered that the deceased suffered from a paralytic stroke early in January of this year. This was followed at intervals of two months by two others. The third was received about six weeks ago. Death was then expected daily, but he rallied some, and his strong physical constitution, much to the surprise of his physicians, has keep thim alive up to this time. "Joo" was keep thim alive up to this time. "Joo" was well known in Canada, in London, Hamilton, Toronto, Whitby and other towns, when he was a professional puglist and drunkard. About six years ago he became converted whilst in a temperance meeting in Rochester, whither he had gone with some drunken companions bent on mischief. He signed the pledge. P. A. Burdick, who has pre-deceased him only a few months, and other friends interested themselves in the new convert. He remained firm to his first vows, and though without education, commenced to engage in temperance work. In February, 1890, he was brought to Toronto by the Canadian Temperance League, and on their behalf conducted a month's temperance revival in the Pavillon and other pubtheir behalf conducted a month's tempe ance revival in the Pavilion and other pubance revival in the Pavilion and other public halls with marvelous success. The league secured his services for a year as evangelist, and sent him out into the country. Equal success followed him wherever he went, and for the best part of 1890, '91 and '92 he spent his time in Canada, visiting in that period Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and British Columbia. Deceased was 42 years of age, and leaves behind him a wife, two daughters and one son.
