

Formerly Taught in the Union School the helpful influences of life. Here-Her Daughter Is Now a London Teacher.

The Tilsonburg Observer, in a biographical sketch of the late Mrs. Jas. Bradburn, whose death occurred there at the home of Mr. Alex. Bradburn, shortly after her return from a visit to her sister, Mrs. Jeffrey, of this city, says: Mrs. Bradburn, whose maiden name was Amy Haley, was born in the historic old town of St. Andrews, N. B., in 1828. When she was about 13 years of age her father removed with his family to the township of Pickening. The farm on which he settled was called Brunswick Hill. Mis-Haley had a love for learning, that the hardships of the early settler's life could not quench, and we find her shortly engaged in teaching, and later taking a course at the Normal School, Toponto. Among her fellow-students were Dr. J. H. Sangster and Dr. Mc-Lellan, both of whom afterwards rose to eminence in the educational profession. After graduating from the Normal School she secured a situation in the London Union school, where she taught for some time. It was the same school that Miss Helen Bradburn, her only daughter, is at present engaged in. She removed from London to in. She removed from London to teach in the Humilton Union school, of
