Examinations Will Not Be Permitted for a Period of

Five Years.

Manchurian Conventice Not Yet Signed -China Appeals to the States-Number of Christians Killed.

SUCCESSFULLY STORMED THE WALL. London, March 13.—The Pekin correspondent of the Morning Post, wiring on Saturday, and giving details of the storming of a gate of the Great Wall by Col. Ledebur's column, March 8, says: "The Germans captured the Chung Chung Pass, between the provinces of Chi Li and Shan Si, after seven hours fighting. This result was brilliantly achieved by the Bayarian battalion, which marched Bavarian battalion, which marched miles from Pao Ting Fu in four days, 125 miles from Pao Ting Fu in four days, through mountains and over difficult mule tracks. The Chinese held an apmule tracks. The Chinese held an apparently impregnable position on the Great Wall at the highest part of the pass. They had several thousand troops and artillery of all descriptions. The Germans attacked them with 600 infantry and two howitzers. The turning movement, over an almost impassable country occupied seven hours and was compared to the company of the com try, occupied seven hours, and was completely successful. The Chinese fled into the province of Shan Si, leaving at least 100 dead, and four Hotchkiss guns. The victory will have an immense moral effect, as the Chinese believed their fortified mountain belt impregnable.

BOXER REVIVAL THREATENED. Pekin, March 12.—Acting on a com-plaint by the American Board of Foreign Missions, Mr. Ragsdale, the United States consul at Tien Tsin, telegraphed to Yuan Shih Kai, governor of Shan Tung, that there was a threatened renewal of Boxer outrages at Un Hsien. Yuan Shih Kai replied that he had sent a force to stop the disorder, which began when the court demourad to the demands of the court demurred to the demands of court demurred to the demands of the powers. The Germans have recently been operating in that direction, having reached Tsang Chou on March 5. A SAD STORY Uncertainty Regarding Suicide Naylor of

Rogers-His Wife Dead From Poison. Windsor, Ont., March 13.-Grief reigned in the home of E. O. B. Rogers, on Park street, this morning. There was an agonizing uncertainty about the correctness of a dispatch that a brother, Naylor Rogers, had committed suicide in Cleveland. The family received a message last night, saying Naylor had committed suicide, later a telegram came denying this. and saying his wife was dead. A dispatch was received from Cleveland later in the day to the effect that it was Mrs. Grace Rogers, wife of Naylor Rogers, who had committed suicide. Her husband, it is said, had been addicted to the liquor habit, but several months ago pledged himself to stop. Rogers was awakened by the prayer, and, as if in a dream, he saw his wife swallow poison. In a second or so he realized the situation, and called for help. His cry came too late, and Mrs. Rogers died from the effects of the deadly drug. Crazed with grief and anguish, Rogers left his home at 454 Prospect street, and has disappeared.
