MIDDLESEX.—A father has 200 acres of land. He gives his son a deed of 75 acres signed only by the father, the mother's name being cancelled wherever it appears on deed. All parties being alive, is such a deed valid? Can the mother dispose of any portion of that property? Can the son dispose of such property while all parties are living? Ans.—The deed is valid as to the title of the father. The mother has a right to dower and can sell her right. If she survives her husband the dower would be one-third of this land. The son can sell the land subject to the right of dower.

SHORT SESSION OF BOARD OF WORKS

Business Was Merely Routine—Civil Service Works Well.

The regular meeting of the board of works was held last night, and occupied only a short space of time. No business of importance was on the slate. A full board was present.

A communication from City Registrar R. H. Dignan, asking for alterations to his office, was referred to the city engineer.

Mr. W. Rodgers asked for remuneration for injuries received on Wellington street, near Dufferin avenue, last month, by slipping and breaking his arm. The matter was referred to the engineer for his report.

A sufficiently signed petition was received, asking that a block on Adelaide street be gravelled and graded. A number of residents of the block were present and aired their grievances. Laid over.

Edward Bowles claimed damages against the city because the sidewalk fronting his property on Talbot street was raised above the level of his land. The committee will see the city solicitor and view the land.

Ald. Cooper reported that the best way out of the Stanley street difficulty was to advise the company to go down Beaconsfield avenue. This did not meet with the approval of the board. Secretary Bell said that a man had telephoned him saying that he would stake \$500 to fight the Beaconsfield avenue plan. The committee instructed the

secretary to report progress in the matter.

Ald. Cooper stated that the stone-pile scheme was working successfully, and that 100 cords had been already broken. He asked whether more stone was to be broken. On motion it was decided to have 100 more cords broken. The pay sheet amounted to \$499.40, of which \$282.03 was for stone-breaking.
