The Middlesex Gerrymander

Above is shown a map of the Middlesex constituencies, as the Whitney Government proposes to shape them. Lobo has been taken from the north riding, and pitched into West Middlesex.

Metcalfe, and the town of Strathroy, are transferred from West to North Middlesex. A glance at the map will show that Metcalfe naturally belongs to the west riding, and not to the north. Under the present arrangement, which was fixed at Confederation, the

population of the two ridings were almost equal, North Middlesex having 14,252, and West Middlesex 14,755. Under the proposed gerrymander, North Middlesex will have a population of 15,903, and West Middlesex of 13,104. These are based on the municipal census of 1907. The whole idea is to increase the Conservative majority in North Middlesex by "hiving the Grits" in the west riding.
