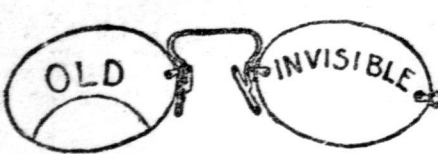

DEFEND DOMINIONS WITH NATIVE FORCES

True Principle of Imperial Defense, Says Lord Milner.

London, April 21.—Lord Milner, speaking at Nottingham, said the true principle of imperial defense is to encourage each Dominion to provide first for the defence of its own soil and shores and all imperial interests there or thereabouts by its own native forces, and that the first thing after that, and springing therefrom, was mutual help. Though there might appear to be a great waste of power in the multiplication of separate forces, it would lead to maximum collective strength in the end.

The C. A. A. U. committee have decided that long-distance races in the same locality may not be put on less than two weeks apart. The Spectator race sanctioned for May 21 having the field, the Scarboro Park request for May 22 was refused.

CUSTOMERS WOULD BE ON EXHIBITION

Inspector Galpin Says Screens Cannot Be Removed From Bars for a Year.

License Inspector Galpin stated to The Advertiser today that nothing could be done in regard to the request of Rev. D. S. Hamilton and Secretary McDermid, of the Temperance League, that the screens be removed from bar-room windows for at least a year, until all amendments to the bylaw have to be taken up with the Provincial authorities before April 1.

"I think the change is too radical," said the Inspector, "and I do not think it will be granted. It would be hardly fair to the hotelmen or to their customers to place those in the bar in full view of all passersby. However, nothing can be done for at least a year, and I do not think the matter will be taken up at all."

The law at present states that all current signs at a hotel or public house must be drawn after the bar is closed and during the time it remains closed.
