

Results of the Municipal Elections

Toronto, Jan. 1.—The election of Toronto's mayor by acclamation and a general feeling on the part of the voters that they were having too many elections this year resulted in one of the most apathetic elections this city has seen in recent years.

The chief fight was for the board of control, which will be composed next year of H. C. Hocken, J. O. McCarthy, Thomas Foster and Thomas Church. The first and last named were members of the 1911 board. Foster is a former controller, and McCarthy was an alderman last year. Controllers Spence and Ward were among the four defeated candidates.

The ratepayers were in a saving mood and defeated by a 3,000 majority the proposition for a five-million-dollar tube railway, while the \$1,700,000 Bloor street viaduct scheme carried by only 1,300. The extension of the hydro-electric system and the civic car lines were approved, but the annexation of North Toronto and the proposed two years' term for council members were voted down.

Woodstock.

Woodstock, Jan. 1.—The municipal elections, which took place here today aroused very little interest. Dr. A. B. Welford was elected over Clifford Kemp, barrister, for mayor, by a majority of nearly five hundred. Others elected were: For aldermen, J. G. McBeath, Geo. King, T. D. Broom, John Butler, W. D. A bylaw to raise \$10,000 for the extension of the street lighting system was carried by over 500 majority, but a bylaw to grant aid to the Woodstock Automobile Company was defeated.

The vote was: Waterworks, 3,705 for, 1,149 against; east end park, 2,253 for, 1,955 against; fire station, 2,904 for, 1,468 against; Gore Park, 2,922 for, 1,468 against.

Chief interest centered in the election of controllers. Controllers Bailey and Gardner were re-elected at the head of the polls, and ex-Controller Allen and ex-Ald. Jutten were also elected. Controller Bailey got 4,523 votes, Gardner 4,448, Allen 3,844, Jutten 3,612, Morris 2,951, Robson 2,286, Sweeney 2,273, Forth 2,202, Campbell 1,422.
