EASTER.

On Easter morning it is said that the sun dances-always with joy, sometimes with the cold, and often behind the curtain of cloud in this, part of the world. Coming at the equinox, when spring is just picking the shell of winter to get out, Easter shows not one green leaf.

Still, half the fun of this festival is in its movable character. It is as fickle as the moon, no more, no less. Its whims are as interesting as the weather, or as woman, whom Virgil has described as "varying and mutable ever." If some people had their way and made a cast-iron, permanent calendar, fixing holidays on the same day of the month and of the week, each year, life would lose a season-

Easter is one of the standard beginnings of spring. Then birds and flowers appear with one leap, upon the ladies' hats. Creation makes its annual repetition, in Paris fashions. No doubt, with these things, to some extent, love is born.

But it is astonishing at how many points we may hold that spring begins. Born in March or May, it was conceived at the winter solstice, when the sun turned back, and 'Halcyon Days' were welcomed by the Greeks, in Solonian Athens or at Jinana in 1913. Every fine, mild day in January or February is said to have a breath of spring in it. Poets, drawing their traditions from sun-burnt Provence, call St. Valentine's Day the opening feast of spring and love. Then birds find their summer mates and get ready for migration. To the farmer, true son of earth, first plowing or sap running, is the date to reckon by. The equinox introduces the longer days at least. Easter is the church's season of victory over winter, darkness and death. April Fools' Day stands for the mad intoxication of the year's new life, when the lunatic takes his flannels off. May Day brings the crane in new houses, or the leaders of European riots. Midbears the musk-rose, the nightin gale and the maple leaves; finally the good old 24th is hailed by cynics as the only genuine spring-day, after many false dawns, in a land where seven months are winter and the rest are mostly fall." 
