





Mrs. Belmont said she approved of everything the English "wild women" have done, and that if woman suffrage is not effected in New York in 1915 militant methods may prevail here.
"The English women will get the vote now before we do, and that will be a disgrace," she said. "People here do not know it, but Mrs. Pankhurst was told by Arthur Balfour and other big men that militant methods must used if the women would win. Men never won their freedom without shed-ding blood, and the women will not get theirs without fighting."

removal of the rainfall from the city streets must be apparent to every citizen. The paving of streets and improvement of roadways are delayed, building operations impeded, and vehicular traffic at times practically impossible, due to the non-removal of rainfall. Menace to Health.

"In addition to the inconvenience and loss sustained by the residents on streets not properly drained, there is the menace to public health. This latter danger is increased, where to relieve the surface flooding, connections have been made into the sanitary sewers the sewage then being flooded back into cellars and basements by

Half Without Storm Sewers. The central business section of city is now served by a system of combined sewers, constructed prior to 1892. From time to time since 1892 a few drains have been laid for the removal of cellar water and street water, without regards to any system. Fully half of the city is unprovided with storm sewers.

Sewers Before Roads. "In 1892, when the population was 32,000, the need of storm sewers in the outlying sections of the city was not present. Today, with a population of 49,000, there are demands for pavements and improved roadways, in the sections that were considered as suburban twenty years ago, which demands cannot be granted by the council in advance of the construction of storm sewers."
