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## FRUIT AND COMMERCIAL

### STRAWBERRIES STILL OFFERED ON MARKET; RASPBERRIES LOWER

Dry Weather Affecting Supply of Potatoes—Hay Is Scarce.

Strawberries are still holding out on the local market. A dealer from Ingersoll offered some of the best that were sold since they first appeared. They found a ready sale at 25c a single box or 25c in crate lots.

Oats are up in price one day and down the next. Today they are selling at \$1.45 1/2 per cwt, and 40¢ 1/2 a bushel.

Hay is not as plentiful as it was last week, and farmers are getting the top price for it, which is \$18 a load.

Raspberries and blackberries are slightly down in price. They are selling at 30c a box retail and 27c and 28c wholesale, and today is expected to be the big day for them, although if the much-needed rain comes today, a larger supply is looked for on Thursday. The black currant crop this year is very poor. Black currants are selling at 30c a quart and reds are selling at 20c.

Potatoes are selling at 75c a peck, but are not as plentiful as was expected, owing to the dry weather. Beans are down to \$1.25 for an 11-quart basket and \$1.25 for a quart. A few home-grown black cherries and red cherries were selling at \$1.50 1/2 for 11 quarts.

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## FORT NORMAN OIL OF LIGHT QUALITY

Dawson, Y. T., July 5.—A party headed by James Macdonald left here yesterday for Edmonton, and on its arrival there will have completed a 3,500-mile trip from Fort Norman. They expect to beat all others who started at the same time over a different route. They estimate that others who started up the Mackenzie River at the opening of navigation will not reach Edmonton before the middle of August. Macdonald believes the route traversed by his party via Fort MacPherson and Porcupine River will become the main winter highway, as it can be negotiated without difficulty.  
The Imperial Oil Company's well is down 875 feet, declared Macdonald, and is a genuine gusher. While dormant last winter it exerted a steady pressure of 40 pounds. The oil is much lighter than ordinary crude oil, and gasoline for local use was made on the ground. Employees burned crude oil for heating and cooking all winter.  
Forty persons arrived at Norman from Edmonton up to February. Only experienced mushers were permitted by the police to proceed.
