

HOLD BANQUET AT KING ST. CHURCH

Men's Brotherhood Stage Successful Social Function.

Rev. J. N. Norton, secretary of the London Brotherhood Federation, announced Monday night, at a banquet of the Men's Brotherhood of the King Street Presbyterian Church, that arrangements had been made to have Dr. J. Foster Wilcox, North American Commissioner of the World Brotherhood Federation, address the London Brotherhoods on the 15th of December.

The annual election of officers was held at the banquet, the following were chosen: President, George Perry; first vice-president, Dr. McDewar; second vice, R. Briggs; secretary, Clifford King; treasurer, F. N. Turnbull.

The banquet was in the nature of a St. Andrew's Day observance, and the program was arranged accordingly. During the banquet the following toasts were proposed: "To the King," "To Scotland and the Old World," responded to by F. Adams and P. E. Farquhar; "To the Brotherhoods," responded to by G. E. Perry and T. H. Yule; "To Our University," responded to by Rev. W. R. Macintosh, who introduced A. R. King, son of Western University, who spoke on "Why London Needs Western University," urging support and giving reasons for the support of the bylaw to be voted on Monday next.

The toast, "To Our Country," was responded to by J. H. Ross, who introduced Rev. James McKay of New St. James' Presbyterian Church, who spoke on "Canada," relating his address on his experiences on a recent trip to the West.

The final toast, "To the Church," was responded to by S. Baker and W. A. Adams. At the suggestion of Mr. Adams the Brotherhood undertook the responsibility of the every-member canvass to be held soon. Selections on the bagpipes were rendered during the evening by Bob Burnside of the London Pipe Band.

EX-EMPEROR LIVES QUIETLY IN EXILE

Punchal, Island of Madeira, Nov. 20.—Former Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary and his empress, Zita, are living a quiet life in their exile. Their only guard at the Villa Victoria, where they reside, is a plain clothes policeman, who also accompanies them on their journeys about the island to prevent beggars from bothering them and to avert other annoyances.

Charles and Zita are treated as honored guests by the new governor, Major Acacio Correa Pinheiro, and the other Portuguese officials. They attend mass on Sundays and have engaged Canon Antonio Homem De Gouveia as their private chaplain. After mass yesterday a few women outside the church attempted to kiss Zita's hands, thus showing their affection for a member of the family of Don Miguel De Braganza, pretender to the Portuguese throne.

BUSY TIME AWAITS BRIAND ON RETURN

Opposition in French Chamber Will Question Stand of Convention Delegation.

Paris, Nov. 20.—The opposition in the chamber of deputies is preparing a busy time for Premier Briand as soon as he gets back to Paris. In addition to the Socialists, who will interpellate the government on the attitude of the French delegation at the Washington conference regarding land disarmament, the Communists announce that they will demand why the government does not release from prison the non-commissioned naval officers Merty and Badine, convicted of mutiny in the Black Sea fleet at the time the crews of the ships tried to hand them over to the Bolsheviks, and who since then have been elected municipal councillors of Paris.

The Conservatives say they will ask the government what it proposes to do about the campaign of the radical party for the rehabilitation of ex-Premier Joseph Caillaux, and the former minister of the interior, Louis Malvy, and the delay in bringing to an issue the long-pending case of Paul Meunier, former radical republican deputy, accused of treason.

France-British relations, the Franco-Turkish accord, the anti-French agitation in Italy, and the protection of citizens in Sicily after evacuation by the French troops, are subjects which are regarded as likely to provoke warm debate in the chamber.

ILLINOIS COLLEGE TO ERECT STADIUM

London Student Tells How Appeal For \$2,500,000 Was Met.

The startling response to a campaign put on by the University of Illinois for a stadium to cost \$2,500,000 is outlined in a letter this week to W. W. Gammon from his son, Fred, a student at the Urbana School.

Within two weeks of the start of the campaign to raise the funds, citizens of Urbana and Champaign, with a combined population of 15,000, had raised \$200,000. The honor students' quota was placed at \$100 each, but the student body had already raised \$1,000,000. The response from the members of the alumni, scattered as they are over the whole world, was unexpectedly rapid, but estimates of the amount from this source would naturally take longer.

The subscriptions call for the first cash payment in January, 1922, with final payments due in five years. The stadium, which is to be completed in 1924 will have a seating capacity of 75,000, and will compare with the huge bowl at Yale, the largest university stadium in the world.

Mr. Gammon calls attention to the fact that the territory surrounding Urbana bears many similarities to Western Ontario from which Western University will draw its financial support in the way of population, industries and agriculture.

URGES FIGHT TO END FOR RIGHTS

HAMILTON, Nov. 23.—Bishop Fallon, of London, in addressing the delegates to the diocesan convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada, in the Royal Connaught Hotel tonight, urged them not to abate their efforts to secure from the Ontario government the educational rights to which he claimed the Catholics of Ontario were fully and reasonably entitled under a clause of the British North America Act.

His Lordship emphasized that this act stipulated that, as the Catholic majority in Lower Canada would respect the educational rights of the Protestant minority, likewise would the Protestant majority of Upper Canada be expected to extend the same rights to the Catholic minority.
