taxpayer must now decide whether he will pay the full amount when he files his return or whether he will pay it in installments of 25% will thereupon write in the date of his declaration, the amount he is forwarding, and place his signature at the bottom of the page. Where possible payment should be made by check or money order, indicating clearly whose tax is being paid.

Separate checks should be with each individual return. If the London Restaurant Company decides to pay the taxes of all its employees, and sends in a check for that purpose, they should indicate clearly how much of the payment is to be credited to each taxpayer. Otherwise, the London Restaurant Company will be credited with the total amount, and the various tax-
