C. F. Swayze Moves Reply To
Speech From Throne in
Ontario House.

INDORSES HYDRO POLICY

Believes Opposition Will
Agree With Premier When
"Smoke Clears Away."

TORONTO, Feb. 15.—The declaration by C. F. Swayze, Labor whip, that the Farmer and Labor members of the Ontario Legislature were as solidly united at the present time behind Premier E. C. Drury as they were at the close of last session, and the claim by W. M. Warren, U. F. O., that the election of D. M. Ross in North Oxford was an endorsement of the government's record, were features in the addresses in the Provincial House this afternoon, when the reply to the speech from the throne, presented yesterday by Lieut.-Governor Henry Cockshutt, was moved and seconded.

Practically every supporter of the government was in his seat when the house opened, while there were many vacancies in the opposition benches, chiefly out-of-town members, who had not yet reached the city. Copies of the new Ontario public school histories, written by Professor George W. Wrong, were laid on the seats of the legislators before the session opened.

Wellington Hay, Liberal leader, and G. Howard Ferguson, leader of the Conservatives, are expected to start off the debate tomorrow afternoon. Tributes to the services rendered the province by Lieutenant-Governor Lionel H. Clarke, J. A. Calder, M. L. A. for North Oxford; D. Racine, M. L. A. for Russell, and John O'Neill, M. L. A. for Southeast Toronto, whose deaths occurred during the recess, were expressed by Premier Drury. Wellington Hay, G. Howard Ferguson, J. E. Thompson of Northwest Toronto, and the mover and seconder of the reply to the speech from the throne.

Swayze Moves Reply.
Mr. Swayze, Labor member for Niagara Falls, in moving the reply, stated that the opening of the session found the Farmer and the Labor branches of the government as firmly united behind Premier Drury as they were when the last session closed. Any divisions that there may have been were all smoothed out, and the coalition was firmly knit. He said that the large proportion of legislation passed since this government came into power, as compared with measures intended solely to benefit

Will Fly Up In Sky Until He Explodes In Ceiling of World

DAYTON, Ohio, Feb. 15.—Lieut. J. P. MacReady, holder of the world's altitude record, is preparing to fly to the ceiling of the world—the altitude at which he estimates his body will explode.

MacReady, dissatisfied with his recent flight record of 40,800 feet, revealed today that he is building a super-charger to carry him 55,000 feet into the air. Before he reaches the altitude his body will burst like a balloon because of the lack of external air pressure, MacReady believes. "The importance of the revelations expected justifies the experiment, regardless of the consequences to myself," MacReady said.

When he explored the 40,000 foot level recently he found an air pressure, refuted the claims that it was a class administration. In outlining the laws put on the statute book since the Farmer-Labor party came into power, Mr. Swayze expressed the hope that the mothers' allowance bill would shortly be extended to include mothers who had but one child dependent on them.

The speaker paid particular attention to the work of the department of education, emphasizing the advantages to the people of New Ontario as a result of founding the school at Monteth, where students might graduate as teachers, and expressed the opinion that further provisions should be made to provide for the educational needs of the north country.

In passing, Mr. Swayze made a rather broad intimation that the new industrial school would in the near future be taken over by the Provincial Government under one of its departments.

Asks House Support.
The Labor member expressed his disapproval of the present system, and appealed very strongly to house members to support any legislation along this line which might subsequently be brought in by the government.

Hon. R. H. Grant, minister of education, said afterwards that although no decision had been reached, an alteration of the system of administration at Mimico was being considered. Indorsing the hydro policy of the government, Mr. Swayze said he was anxious to know what the total cost of the Chippawa undertaking would be. He had watched that work, and had his own opinions, but was not going to express them to the house at present. When the smoke had cleared away he believed that many members of the opposition would agree with the stand the premier had taken.

Mr. Swayze said he was a strong advocate of public ownership, in fact had been one long before the hydro began, but he believed the premier's stand was in the best interests of public ownership.

Warren Lauds Drury.
R. M. Warren, U. F. O. member for North Renfrew, in seconding the address, said, in reference to hydro:

sure of only three pounds per square inch. Fifteen thousand feet higher he believes may bring a collapse to the plane, a failure of the engine, an inefficiency in the super-charger or an explosion of his body. The newly-constructed craft will care for the first three possibilities.

His body was puffy and the tissues had begun to feel the strain of the altitude, when MacReady made his record. He pushed the nose of his plane upward, but its mechanical limit had been reached. Then he said he determined to explore the higher region.

MacReady has not decided when his experiment will be attempted, and said only personal friends would know of it until the flight had been made.

"I feel sure that my constituents in North Renfrew will appreciate the attitude of the prime minister. I do know that there is a feeling abroad among people generally today that they will indorse and back up a government that will adopt a policy of careful husbanding of our resources."

He said that the rural districts received less than 1 per cent of the hydro power developed. He indorsed the statements of the premier at Hamilton, and believed that the great majority of the people of the province would also indorse them. He emphasized the difficulties under which the farmers of the province were laboring with falling prices of their commodities, which, he claimed, had gone down much faster than had manufactured goods.

Mr. Warren complimented Attorney-General Raney on his stand against profiteers, and made a strong plea for reforestation on an extensive scale.

CAN PAY TAX IN INSTALLMENTS

In filling out an income tax return it is important that the following points be observed. They have been prepared for The London Advertiser by John W. Plewes, assistant tax inspector for London district.

Making Payment.
The taxpayer must now decide whether he will pay the full amount when he files his return or whether he will pay it in installments of 25%. He will thereupon write in the date of his declaration, the amount he is forwarding, and place his signature at the bottom of the page. Where possible payment should be made by check or money order, indicating clearly whose tax is being paid.

Separate checks should be sent with each individual return. If the London Restaurant Company decides to pay the taxes of all its employees, and sends in a check for that purpose, they should indicate clearly how much of the payment is to be credited to each taxpayer. Otherwise, the London Restaurant Company will be credited with the total amount, and the various taxpayers will be billed for their individual taxes in due course.

Partnerships are not taxed. If a partnership check is received, information should be forthcoming as to how much of the payment should be credited to each partner. The income tax act refers to individuals and corporations, and all payments made should be clearly identified as "payment on account" of some individual or corporation.

OPENS INQUIRY AS TO LUMBER USED

Trustee Silverwood Investi-
gates Victoria School
Flooring.

Of what origin is the lumber that was used for the floors in the new Victoria public school, South London?

On Thursday morning Trustees A. E. Silverwood opened his inquiry to ascertain definitely as to this question and on Thursday afternoon he applied for a copy of the original specifications of the school in question.

"I am not sure," Trustee Silverwood explained, "whether this lumber comes from the same source as that which was used in the new collegiate institute, but I intend to find out. It may be that it is of the same grade, and if such is the case it will certainly raise a controversial question on the board. I am asking for a copy of the specifications of the school this afternoon as I will need it for private investigation of my own."

While February was set as the probable date for the opening of the Victoria school, it is now problema-

tical as to whether plans will be carried out as expected.

At the last meeting of No. 2 committee the question of a report was left to Trustee Rice, chairman of the committee and at that time Trustee Silverwood asked questions regarding the floors and the origin of the lumber used.

He cautioned the officials to make sure before the school was finally accepted from the contractors.
