CRITICISM OF BALDWIN FOR MINE SURRENDER IS GROWING IN BRITAIN

Churchill Finds Difficulty
Drafting Details of Sub-
sidy Plan.

HIT GOLD STANDARD

Railway and Textile Industries
Seethe With Wage
Question.

Associated Press Despatch.

London, Aug. 3.—The incidence of
a popular bank holiday today did not
prevent a continuance in increased
measure of adverse criticism of
Prime Minister Baldwin's so-called
surrender to the trade unionists in the
coal miners' dispute.

A curious feature of the situation
has been the sudden growth in the
amount of criticism of the hasty
restoration of the gold standard as
the main cause for the slump in the
coal industry.

This criticism, formerly
confined to a few newspapers, has
taken a new lease of life from the
strictures of Sir Josiah C. Stamp,
the well-known economist, in the
report of the government court of
inquiry into the coal dispute. Premier
Baldwin was asked in the House of
Commons today whether the govern-
ment purposed to investigate this
matter. He replied that it was
receiving examination and consid-
eration.

Chancellor of the Exchequer
Churchill and the other treasury
officials are said to be finding great
difficulty in drafting the details
regulating the subsidy to the mines,
which was only hurriedly outlined at
the last moment to avoid a stoppage
of work, and it is presumed that the
final draft will not be ready for
debate in parliament on Thursday.

For the moment, little is being
heard of the other industrial dis-
putes in the country, but both in the
railway and textile industries wage
questions still remain unsettled, and
may cause trouble in the future.

FIGHT JUST STARTED.

Associated Press Despatch.

London, Aug. 2.—At a labor meet-
ing last night at Renishaw, near
Chesterfield, A. J. Cook, secretary of
the miners' federation, declared that
the crisis was over for the present,
but that the fight was only just be-
ginning. He advised the miners to
concentrate on the whole coal indus-
try because, he said, it was going to
be theirs.

The miners, he added, need not be
afraid of a fortnight's suspension. It
was a fight now between the govern-
ment and the owners.

Associated Press Despatch.

London, Aug. 3.—Trade unionists
of the old school, who are regarded
as fossilized by the new leaders
such as A. J. Cook, secretary of the
miners' federation, are shaking their
heads over the latest demonstration
of the power achieved by the union
in connection with the threatened
strike of coal miners last week.

George Nicoll Barnes, who served
as labor member of the house of
commons for Glasgow, from 1905 to
1922, and who for many years has
taken an active part in the co-opera-
tive movement, told the Daily Mail
that when years ago he helped
organize the unskilled workers, he
never foresaw that they one day
would "take the community by the
throat."

"In view of what happened last
week," he declared, "the community
must in some way recover itself and
become the top dog. The real ele-
ment, although small in numbers,
has assumed the direction. It is
represented only to a small extent to
positions of authority in the trade
unions, but the leaders are being
dragged along by it.

"Among the signatories of last
week's order for forbidding the trans-
port of coal in event of a strike were
men who know the goal to which
they are heading, and who would see
blood spilled without compunction.

"The future course of events can-
not be forecast; one can only think
the country is marching to industrial
chaos."

**SIX INJURED AS TRAIN
HITS CROWDED AUTO**

Fear Death of Woman With
Fractured Skull—Others
Will Recover.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Belleville, Aug. 3.—Six persons
were injured, one probably fatally
this afternoon near Tweed, when a
crowded motor car was struck by a
C. P. R. freight train. The accident
occurred between Tweed and Sul-
phide. Those injured are: Richard
and Mrs. Hyatt and Baby Joan of
Pictou, William and Mrs. W. Fulford
of Trenton, and Mrs. Cronk of Sul-
phide. The latter is suffering from a
fractured skull and it is feared she
will die. The others will recover. They
were attended by Tweed doctors and
later brought to Belleville hospital.

BERLIN RATIFIES CONVENTION.

Geneva, Aug. 3.—The German gov-
ernment has filed with the League
of Nations its ratification of the con-
vention for the simplification of
customs formalities, which 34 nations
signed at Geneva in November, 1924
(this convention became operative
November 27, 1924).

**Buffalo Deserting Northland
For Comforts of Old Reserve**

Canadian Press Despatch.

Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 3.—The bulk
of the Buffalo herd shipped from
Wainwright National Park to the
Wood Bison reserve in the far north
recently, is reported to be on its
way back home again.

According to trappers reaching this
city, the animals are making their
way through the northern woods,
fording rivers, and overcoming other
obstacles. A large herd is reported
to have been seen in the vicinity of
Fort Chipewyan, hemmed in by the
border waters of Lake Athabasca
and a maze of channels and swamps.

More than 1,600 bison were ship-
ped north by rail and scows to roam
at liberty on the fringe of the Arctic
circle.

Law May Force Irish To Study

Dublin, Aug. 3.—The Free State
government has introduced, and
will attempt, to have passed at the
next session of the Dail Eireann, an act compelling all
children between the ages of six
and fourteen to attend school.
Hitherto, education has not been
compulsory.

**MANY NOMINATED
FOR LEGISLATURE**

Stiff Fight Predicted in New
Brunswick Elections Next
Week.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Fredericton, N.B., Aug. 3.—Ninety-
eight candidates were nominated to-
day for the 48 seats in the next New
Brunswick legislature, the members
of which will be elected when the
people of New Brunswick go to the
polls Monday, Aug. 10. Nomination
proceedings were held today at the
shire towns of the fifteen counties
of the province and also at the four
urban constituencies, two of which
have been constituted since the last
general provincial elections.

In the four urban constituencies
there are straight fights between gov-
ernment and opposition candidates,
and the same is true of twelve of
the fifteen counties. Of two of the
remaining three counties there will
be three-cornered fights. In Res-
taouche, Hon. C. H. Lablanc of Dal-
housie, former minister of public
works, was nominated as an inde-
pendent Liberal, and in Kings, John
E. McAuley of Lower Millstream was
nominated as an independent Con-
servative. It was expected up to the
last minute that there would also be
a three-cornered fight in Nor-
thumberland, where John S. Martin,
Labor member in the last house, had
been actively in the field, but he re-
tired and was not nominated today.

A crisis between the lumbermen
on matters of stumpage rates and a
proposal to inaugurate the so-called
Quebec revolution in this province is
attracting equally as much attention
as the government's hydro develop-
ment project at Grand Falls, for
which authority was taken at the last
session of the legislature for the
issue of about \$9,000,000 of bonds, this
also to include provision for the
transmission system similar to the
public-owned system in Ontario. The
opposing leaders, Premier Veniot,
leader of the government, and Hon.
J. B. Baxter, leader of the opposi-
tion, are starting their final tours
of the province today, upon comple-
tion of the nomination proceedings.

**BEATTY IS URGED
TO SUCCEED BYNG**

Lord Beaverbrook Thinks Ad-
miral To Be Highly Quali-
fied For Job.

Associated Press Despatch.

London, Aug. 3.—The Daily Ex-
press, Lord Beaverbrook's paper, re-
ferring to the forthcoming expiry of
Lord Byng's term as governor-gen-
eral of Canada, suggests that Earl
Beatty, admiral of the fleet, is
qualified to be Lord Byng's suc-
cessor as the dominion's governor-
general.

The Express says the governor-
general's office practically has be-
come that of an ambassador of
Great Britain to the Canadian people,
and the atmosphere surrounding the
relations between Canada and Great
Britain are peculiarly difficult just
now.

"This makes the choice of the
next governor-general of Canada a
matter of great importance," the
Express continues. "Of those qualified
for the task and likely to be free to
accept, Earl Beatty would appear
to be the most obvious choice. His
term in the admiralty expires almost
at the same time as Lord Byng's
term as governor-general, and he
would be most acceptable to the
dominion. His temperament is
peculiarly suitable to that of the Cana-
dians. He possesses a personality
which radiates and has an im-
mediate effect on all with whom he
comes in contact, and his bluntness
would by no means be displeasing
to Canada."

RED PROPAGANDA SEIZED.

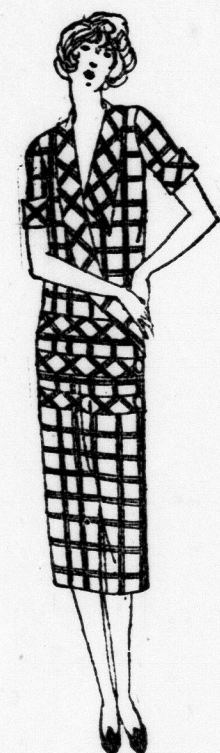

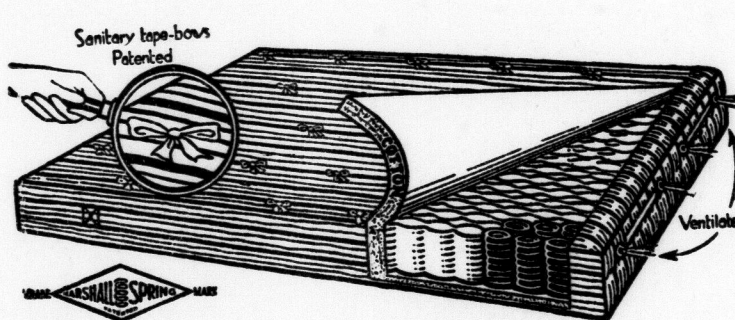
