

BRITAIN DEMANDS EVACUATION OF THE RUHR Orangemen of District Throng To Chatham

LONDON ORANGE LODGES JOIN CHATHAM THROG ON GLORIOUS TWELFTH

With Flags and Fife and Drum They Go by Special Train To
Take Part in Great Celebration—Many Places
Observe the Day.

THREE BIG MEETINGS HELD AT TORONTO

To the tune of fife and drum, several hundred members of the Orange Order in London marched to the C. P. R. station at 8:30 o'clock this morning, and enroute to Chatham for Chatham, one of the points in Western Ontario chosen as the scene for a monster celebration of the Glorious Twelfth.

Representatives of all the Orange Lodges and the auxiliary lady lodges left the city, a special train being chartered for the trip. Several bands departed with the lodges.

London itself was quiet, and numerous Orangemen who were unable to make the trip to Chatham contented themselves by wearing their badges.

Among the lodges represented in the exodus to Chatham were Ahoghill, 320; Pro Patria, Langemarck, Hackett, Orange Young Britons, Beaver, Nassau, Boyne, William Lowe, Forest City, Star of Bethlehem, the Royal Scarlet, County Lodge, and the four Black Preceptories, namely: Covenant, 345; Inniskilling, 333; Langemarck, 336, and King Solomon, 337.

Many Orangemen did not take advantage of the special train and reduced fares on the C. P. R., but motored to Chatham.

From early morning until noon, carloads of Orangemen in full regalia could be seen on the provincial highway, heading west.

With the Orangemen were their wives and children. Quite a number of babies were in the party, their parents being convinced that London has just as many Orange babies capable of winning prizes, as any other municipality in Western Ontario.

Although the day is quiet in London, nevertheless London Orangemen are celebrating the Glorious Twelfth, in this they never fail.

Tonight the various lodges, with their bands, will return to London and march to their lodgerooms, where they will disband.

**WILL SHOW PUBLIC
WORK OF POSTOFFICE**
Postal Authorities Rent Exhibition Space for Western Fair.

Secretary A. M. Hunt yesterday assigned space to the London postoffice officials at the Western Fair for the purpose of demonstrating the workings of a postoffice at the fair in September.

The model postoffice will be located in the government exhibits building, and besides carrying on the actual postoffice duties of one fair grounds, an educational program will be put on in order to make the public better acquainted with the proper method of tying and addressing parcels and other mail matter.

Postmaster T. C. Duncan is enthusiastic over the exhibit, and went to the fair grounds yesterday afternoon with President Saunders, Secretary Hunt and E. S. Little to make spacing arrangements for the exhibit.

Secretary Hunt says: "The establishing of a real postoffice at the fair grounds will relieve us of considerable worry, as it has been difficult and unsatisfactory to handle mail through the information office, as we have done in the past."

**FIVE MINERS KILLED
BY ORE CAR IN SHAFT**

J. B. MacLachlan, district secretary of the United Mine Workers, also arrived from Halifax. Between three and four hundred men were waiting quietly on the platform for his arrival. He was taken by car to Dominion No. 4, where he was to address a mass meeting. A number of cars followed from Sydney.

TWO AVIATORS KILLED SURVEYING IN QUEBEC

Men Working For Price Bros. Meet Death When Motor Stalls.

Chicoutimi, Que., July 12.—Two aviators were instantly killed here late Tuesday afternoon when the Price Brothers Company crashed into the Saguenay River, apparently as a result of a defect in the motor of the machine. The two victims are Aviator Holdam, the pilot, and his assistant, Mr. Evans.

At four o'clock Tuesday afternoon the two men left on surveying operations in the forest surrounding the Saguenay River. They followed the course of that river for some time and had reached about 300 feet in the air when the motor became silent and suddenly the machine was seen to take a plunge.

FLOODS IN SPAIN.

Says France Aided Russia By Occupation of the Ruhr

Gustave Stresemann, German People's Leader, Declares Citizens Convinced of Justice of Cause and Will Continue To Fight.

Berlin, July 12.—"If Paris had wanted to extend a helping hand to Moscow it could not have done so better than it has through the execution of the French policy in the Ruhr. The result of six months of the Ruhr struggle is economic, financial and social chaos. German economy has days of crucifixion both behind and before it. Intercourse between our richest industrial region and the rest of Germany has been completely cut off. This has led to the circulation of trillions of paper money scraps, inferior in value even to the Austrian crown. Such a flood of paper money is the worst way to expropriation and an overrunning of Bolshevism."

"Neither in Germany nor outside is there to be found a credit item bookable to the Ruhr invasion. Germany has opposed her new hardships and sufferings with the weapon of passive resistance. She will continue to use that weapon. There is no German who is not convinced of the justice of Germany's cause in this fight," the leader asserts.

**CHARGE CITY CHINESE
WITH HAVING OPIUM**
Juh Fong and John Hing Are Allowed Out On \$500 Bail.

A complete opium smoking layout was produced in police court this morning when Juh Fong and John Hing, Orientals, appeared charged with violation of the Narcotics Act. The case was adjourned until Saturday morning, the two men being allowed out on \$500 bail.

Fong is charged with possessing narcotics while Hing will be tried for smoking opium. The arrest was made by Inspector Lucas, Sergeant Oakley, P. C. Easton and Monahan, at a house, 322 King street, last night. Howard Cluff is appearing on behalf of the Chinamen.

A. Byrne was fined \$10 and costs for selling cigarettes to a minor. He was paid before court opened.

MAYOR DENIES HE IS AFTER CLERGY ON SUNDAY SWIM

Reiterate, However, That City Pools Should Provide Facilities.

SPORTING OFFER

Willing To Take the Critics Through Part of London On Bath Tub Hunt.

Mayor Wenige hotly resents the imputation that he is "engaged in a controversy with the London clergy," aggravated by the London Ministerial Alliance objection to the use of municipal swimming pools on Sunday.

"I am not attacking the clergymen," His Worship stated. "They are doing a great work and I am not interested as to where they go or what they do on Sundays."

"I do object, however, to their interference in one phase of civic activity and not in another. I speak of their objection to the Sunday use of the children's bathing pools and not to the use of the L. & P. S. bath house and facilities at the lake. If one is stopped the other should."

"It is not wrong to bathe or wash on Sundays. The clergy acknowledged that themselves. I maintain that the swimming pools are filling a great want. If there are those who disagree with me I am willing to take them out through a certain section of the city any time and visit the first hundred homes and see how many bath tubs we'll encounter."

SUPPORT MINISTERS ON SUNDAY SWIMMING

London School Inspectors Think Opening of Pools Would Hurt Teachings.

The public school inspectors, V. K. Greer and G. A. Wheable, have heartily concurred with the stand taken by the ministers of the city against the opening of the public playgrounds for use on Sundays.

The inspectors state that nothing could be more contrary to the teaching in our public schools than the encouragement of children to make use of the Sabbath in this way. They are quite sure that a great majority of the public school teachers in London would characterize the opening of swimming pools on Sunday as a distinctly backward step.

"Canada has a unique position in the world for its observance of the Sabbath day," said Mr. Greer, "and no city in Canada has exemplified Sabbath observance better than London. We earnestly hope that London will continue to hold its high ideals in this respect."

It is the hope of the inspectors that the churches and schools may cooperate more and more in the future in the matter of religious training for children," continued Mr. Greer.

Who have playgrounds and swimming pools opened on Sunday would be a negative influence to the work of the schools and churches."

**SURPLUS OF QUEBEC
REACHES \$1,300,000**

The Provincial Treasurer Announces Statement Shows Slight Decrease for Year.

Quebec, July 12.—At noon today, Honorable Jacob Nolin, provincial treasurer, announced that the surplus of the Province of Quebec for the fiscal year, June 30, reached one million three hundred thousand dollars. This includes part of the profit of the Quebec liquor commission available for the year ending April 30.

Last year, roughly, the surplus of the province had reached five millions, but Mr. Nolin explained the decrease by the increased expenditure in the closing year. He stated he was very pleased with the results and added that further details on the financial situation of the province would be available by Aug. 1.

BRITAIN DEMANDS RUHR OCCUPANCY COME TO END AND ALLIES FIX DEBT

Premier Baldwin in the Commons and Curzon in the House of Lords Voice British Policy on Reparations Tangle—Members Cheer to the Echo When the Announcement Is Made.

MUST CONSIDER GERMANY'S LAST OFFER

London, July 12.—Britain, through Premier Baldwin in Commons and Marquis Curzon in Lords, today demanded that occupation of the Ruhr come to an end and that the allies unite in fixing a fair amount for reparations and asking Germany to pay it.

This was the gist of the long-awaited statement of British policy towards the reparations problem.

Baldwin was cheered to the echo as he pleaded for allied co-operation as well as an end of Ruhr ventures. A break with France is considered averted if the French Government returns a favorable answer.

Security of Europe.
The essential factors of settlement of Europe's ills," Baldwin told a crowded house, are:

"First, payment of reparations. Second, settlement of inter-allied debts. Third, security of Europe."

Italy, the prime minister said, is understood to be in accord with Britain on these points.

Referring to the last German reparations offer, Baldwin said that whether the late enemy's offer was adequate or not, it should not be ignored, but should be examined to discover if there were any possibility of progress.

"Our proposals have no other aim than pacification of Europe and recovery of an exhausted world," Baldwin declared, while the Commons cheered.

The British reply to the latest German note, he said, is to be forwarded forthwith. It will be first submitted to the allies, however, in the hope of securing joint action. This will be the chance of France and Belgium to renew the bonds of the entente.

Co-operation Is Vital.
Unity of action, co-operation by the allies, is a vital necessity, Baldwin declared.

Germany, he said, is rapidly approaching economic chaos, which will be succeeded by social and industrial ruin, in the meanwhile, genuine apprehension exists as to food shortage conditions, which are causing serious alarm to Britain.

A copy of the British reply to Germany's latest note will be sent to the United States, Baldwin said in reply to Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the Labor party group.

"The sole ground of urgency among the allies is as to the best effective means of realizing the ends which are vital to all," the premier declared in opening his speech. "Namely the payment of reparations and recovery of the security of Europe."

Make Germany Pay.
Great Britain is as determined as any of the allies to make Germany pay reparations to the fullest extent of which she is capable, Baldwin said while the Commons cheered and allies' ambassadors in the gallery restrained with difficulty from applauding.

At the moment when Baldwin was addressing the House, Marquis Curzon was making a similar statement in the House of Lords.

"But if we ask Germany to pay in excess of her capability," Baldwin continued, "we shall not succeed in accomplishing our purpose."

"I am firmly convinced that a measure resulting in the ruin of Germany would be fatal to Britain, to the allies and to all the world."

"The allies are obtaining less reparations now than before the Ruhr occupation began."

"And such reparations as we have received have been exacted at the price of growing distress in Germany, economic system, and probably the entire collapse thereof."

"Recovery of the world is endangered and peace is at stake," Baldwin declared, as a result of France's and Belgium's invasion of the Ruhr and the consequent unsettled state of things in Europe.
