Yankee Stadium, Oct. 12.—For the first time since the 1923 world's series began Gotham today really was in baseball fever. Lured by the call of the mighty bat of Babe Ruth; coaxed on by the knowledge that at least a New York Yankee team could stand toe-to-toe and take it with any Giant outfit, the town went baseball mad. In the two previous games, neither the great Yankee stadium nor the imposing Polo Grounds was filled, but when the word went out last night that Babe Ruth finally had arrived as a ball punching world's series hitter, and that the series stood at a dead heat, the fans caught on. They grasped the old world's series excitement; the tang; the blood-tingling that the older renewals of the October classic had inspired. The Stadium was crowded today. At 1 o'clock all the gates, except those to the reserved seats, were closed and the police began to disperse a howling mob lined up for the bleachers and the upper tiers of the grandstand.

**FERGUSON DENIES PLAN TO KILL REGULATION 17**

Toronto, Oct. 12.—"There is absolutely nothing to it," stated Hon. G. H. Ferguson, premier of Ontario, this morning, when questioned regarding a statement credited to Premier Veniot of New Brunswick, to the effect that the Ferguson government was considering the abolition of "Regulation 17," which makes the teaching of English in French schools compulsory in Ontario.

"No such statement was made by me," was the flat denial of the premier. "I was talking with Mr. Veniot, and told him that the regulation was working satisfactorily where the schools saw fit to observe it."

## WON'T HALT MEET OF LONDON JOCKEY CLUB AT NIAGARA

Provincial Officials Will Take Evidence of Betting at Track.

Toronto, Oct. 12.—No attempt could be made to prevent the London Jockey Club from holding the meet at Niagara Falls, starting tomorrow, according to a statement made to The Advertiser today by Attorney-General Nickle.  
Provincial officials will be on hand to take evidence of any betting that is carried on, however, and subsequent government prosecution will be based on their observations.

Chamonix, France, Oct. 12.—Work is progressing very satisfactorily on the various sites where the skating, hockey, curling, bob-sleigh and skiing events will be competed on the slopes of Mont Blanc, marking the opening of the 1924 Olympic games. The skating rink will provide a track of four hundred metres in conformity with international regulations. The bob-sleigh chute running down the slopes of Mont Blanc, traversing an admirable feat of fir and spruce trees, is one of the most impressive of the kind in the world. The ski jumps were selected by Mr. Wording of Sweden, considered one of the most experienced and competent men in the sport, who is personally supervising the work on the take-offs. Beginning January 25 until February 5, the following events will be run off:  
Speed skating, 500, 1,500, 5,000 and 10,000 metres; figure skating for men, women and couples; ski, one race of 12 and another 50 kilometres; ski-jump, hockey championships and curling.

## MUCH DISCUSSION FOLLOWS SPEECH OF LLOYD GEORGE

New York Herald Construes Words as Warning of Another War.  
TIMES OPTIMISTIC

New York, Oct. 12.—The speeches made in Canada by Right Hon. David Lloyd George, Britain's wartime premier, are being eagerly followed here and throughout the United States. His Toronto speech has created a great deal of discussion, being interpreted by several writers here as a warning to Canada that another war is impending.

The Herald says today that in his Toronto speech the former premier practically served notice on Canada that another war is brewing in Europe, a war from which Great Britain will not be able to hold aloof.  
"That means that Canada will march again; for where the British empire is seriously threatened there the Dominion will be found, even though there be no compulsion in the equation," it says, adding: "That brings the argument rather closer to the United States than it has been heretofore. What hurts Canada hurts the United States indirectly. Whatever hinders the progressive economic development of Canada injures our own economic development, so closely bound together are these two nations."

The paper urges the calling of another international conference, similar to the Washington conference, for the limitation of aircraft, poison gas, and submarines.  
The Times comments on the Toronto speech in a somewhat less pessimistic tone. It takes the view that despite the situation in Europe the nations do not want war and will not seriously consider it. "The Canadian speeches of Mr. Lloyd George," says the Times, "have thus far been a mixture of gratitude and warning. He exhorts Canada not to believe that the peril of war is forever removed. She may have to do again what she undertook in 1914. As an old observer in the watchtower he thinks he discerns preparations for another war, which would be more destructive and more horrible than the last."

The Times believes that Mr. Lloyd George is entirely sincere and that if he has any ulterior motive at all it lies in his desire to hold the British empire together for "his utterances will doubtless have their echo in the imperial conference in London."

**SIR WILLIAM MULLOCK WILL BE CHANCELLOR**

Toronto, Oct. 12.—Sir William Mullock, who succeeded the late Sir William Meredith as chief justice of Ontario, will probably become chancellor of Toronto University, also in succession to Sir William Meredith.
