The price paid has not been disclosed, but it is known to exceed six million pounds, for this amount was refused by Hulton when offered that amount by the firm of Sir William Berry and his brothers. It is well known that Lloyd George has long been interested in a group of London newspapers, of which the chief are the Daily Chronicle and Lloyds' Sunday News. While he was on the Mauretania he was informed by wireless of the results of various interests trying to get the Hulton papers. Despite the editorial statement of the "Make House Wife Pay" Morning post, it is difficult to believe that Lloyd George is in partnership with either Beaverbrook or Rothermere. It is recalled that on a famous occasion Lloyd George warned Mr. Asquith against Lord Rothermere.
