QUESTION OF FEMALE HELP.

Berlin possesses a number of industries which require female help, because of the nature of the work.

In the shirt and collar trade and the white-collar business, young women only can do the bulk of the work required to be done.

Manufacturing conditions are gradually improving, and will continue to do so as the element of uncertainty about the crop disappears. In the lines referred to, trade is brisk, and they are face to face with a situation which in 1908, led several institutions to establish branch factories in other places.

Unless a solution of the difficulty can be found very soon it will result in a more general adoption of the plan of subsidiary plants in neighboring towns and villages, where female help can be had.

Berlin citizens are noted for their public spirit, for their desire to see their town grow and prosper; for excelling in town-building as well as in making first class manufactured goods.

They will be quick to see that the most business-like and most desirable way is to have local industries extending their plants here, thus employing more people and generally benefitting the whole community.

The heads of such industries would themselves much prefer to put "all their eggs in one basket" and to watch that basket. But, to be frank, the scarcity of the class of help named is so great that unless it can be met in the near future, Berlin will suffer.

The Record believes that the situation warrants a conference on the part of the different bodies most closely interested in promoting the town's welfare. A conference which will take up this question in earnest and find its solution. It is important enough to interest the best minds in Berlin. But it demands immediate attention.
