MEETING OF THE TOWN COUNCIL

Police Resolution Declared Illegal, Other Matters Dealt With.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Firemen's Hall Monday evening, His Worship Mayor McKay presiding, Couns. Wallace, Patterson, Moores, Bisset, Chamberlain, St. Onge and Duncan were present.

The minutes of the previous regular and a special meeting were read and approved.

A communication from the School Board re taking a school census of the town was read and referred to the Education and Improvement committee for a report.

H. A. Carr, Town Solicitor, submitted a lengthy opinion as to the legality of the resolution passed recently defining the duties of the police. This stated clearly that the resolution was not a legal and proper one.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

B. F. CARVELL UPHOLDS Q. O. RY.

Says Men Who Are Trying to Run Railway Are Patriots.

Montreal, March 23.—When the appeal of the Chicoutimi Pulp Co. against the rates charged by the Atlantic Quebec and Western Railway on coal from Gaspe to Chandler, P. Q., and on wood pulp from Chandler to Gaspe came before the Board of Railway Commissioners this morning, Chairman Carvell spoke in complimentary terms of the Atlantic Quebec and Western.

After referring to the tremendous difficulties confronting the Railway, he added "if ever there was a body of out and out patriots, it is the men who are trying to run that railway."

If the rates had been increased as it was on Mr. Carvell's recommendation and there was no doubt what his decision would be in the matter. After some further argument as to the legal aspect of the question, Mr. Carvell said:

"I want to tell you if these people are within the law, as far as I am concerned they are going to stay there. If you can show they are not—well, it may be necessary to change the law for them."

Chairman Carvell later became impatient and challenged Mr. Iverson who spoke for the Chicoutimi Company to show that the Railway Company had charged more than the law allowed them. Mr. Iverson argued Prohibition Enforcement. The law declares that such enforcement is part of the civic duties of the town policeman and, as such, no neglect can be permitted. In the matter of other civic duties, we believe that the Police & License Committee could properly direct the police officers without endangering the carrying out of any law.

MEETING OF THE TOWN COUNCIL

After considerable discussion Coun. St. Onge moved that the matter be laid over until the next meeting so that councillors can have a chance to think the matter over.

Coun. Patterson moved in amendment that the question be dealt with at once.

The original motion passed on a vote of St. Onge, Wallace, Duncan and Chamberlain for and Moore's, Bisset and Patterson against.

Applications were read from Frank M. Watson and Patrick H. Doyle for position of meter reader and collector of rates and taxes.—Laid on the table.

Wm. Brown and Mrs. Margaret Kerr wrote complaining of assessment for 1920. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

A petition from residents of Ward III asking for extension of Cromwell Avenue was read and referred to the Public Property and Streets Committee for a report.

Departmental accounts were ordered paid.

The Assessment and Appeals Committee reported recommending that Thos. Henry be granted refund of poll tax, he being over sixty years of age and that Mrs. John Ward's assessment be reduced \$600.00, and that poll tax be struck off. Report received and adopted.

Coun. Bisset moved that the Town Clerk be authorized to get prices on or pricing necessary forms for Electric Light department tabulating system.—Carried.

Coun. Duncan of the Finance Committee read draft of a bill to go to the legislature asking permission to issue \$19,000 bonds to pay off overdraft on Fire Station. He moved that same be sent to legislature.—Carried.

Mrs. R. Barclay Gerrard, was given permission to address the Council in behalf of the W.C.T.U., on the matter of the resolution re policemen's duties passed at a recent meeting. She made a strong appeal for the rescinding of the motion and a rigid enforcement of the Prohibition Act.

Rev. Mr. Boothroyd also spoke along the same lines.

Coun. Moores complained that the Councilors had no copy of the Town Bylaws and suggested that steps be taken to procure same, duly amended.

Coun. St. Onge moved that the matter of consolidation of Bylaws be left with the Bylaw and Legislation Committee, and report next meeting.—Carried.

Coun. Moores gave notice that at the next meeting he would move a resolution fixing the hour of adjournment for 11 o'clock.

Coun. Duncan requested that the appointment of the official to read meters and collect all rates and taxes be left over until the next meeting.

Coun. Moores spoke strongly against the men reading meters being stopped and moved that they be ordered to proceed with this work.

Coun. Duncan said that a permanent man would be chosen in a week.

Motion was lost.

Coun. Moores asked what progress had been made in the auditing of the books and the preparing of the copy for the Annual Report.

The clerk reported that the work could be ready in a very short time.

Coun. Wallace moved that the Auditor be requested to submit his report for the next meeting.—Carried.

Coun. Wallace submitted deed of Hillside Street from Robt. L. Duncan together with an agreement in reference to same.

Coun. Bisset moved that deed be referred to the town solicitor for his opinion as to its legality.—Carried.

The council then adjourned.

OBITUARY.
James Harquail, on Thursday, March 17th, Dalhousie has lost one of her oldest and most highly esteemed residents. Mr. Harquail was in his 79th year and up to within twelve days of his death enjoyed good health and took an active interest in public affairs.

Mr. Harquail was born in Dalhousie, his father, John Harquail, coming here from the Isle of Jersey about the year 1826, and was one of the first settlers in Dalhousie.

Being of a very kind and genial disposition he was loved and respected by all and many incidents are related of his kind and charitable acts. In his own family he was cherished and revered, receiving that deference and love which his long fruitful years deserved—a tribute to a truly model husband and father.

Fifty-seven years ago he married Mary Carroll of Cork, Ireland, who survives him, also her daughters, Rev. Sister Harquail and Rev. Sister Carroll of the Hotel Dieu, Campbellton, N. B.; Mrs. M. W. Doyle, Stephenson, Hamilton; Mrs. E. Keenan, Mont Joli, P. Q.; Mrs. J. H. Driscoll, St. John, N. B., and Helena at home; and John and David of J. & D. A. Harquail Co., Ltd., Campbellton; and twenty grandchildren.

All his family were at his bedside continually during the twelve days of his illness.

The funeral took place from the Church of St. John the Baptist, Saturday morning, the 19th instant, the requiem high mass being celebrated by Rev. Father Hart, assisted by the Rev. Father Lantegny of Athol.

The pall bearers were Messrs. W. A. R. Cragg, S. Blanchard, Charles Stewart, James Wright, G. E. Mercier and Thos. Dundas.

Cornelius McKinney.

The death of Mr. Cornelius McKinney occurred at the Belguim Brothers Hospital, Montreal. He had been ill for a few weeks and it was thought advisable to have him removed to Montreal to undergo an operation from which he never recovered.

He was 45 years of age and loved to mourn his loss a large number of friends besides his father, Timothy McKinney, four brothers, John of Toronto; Parnel, Montreal; James and Patrick at home and six sisters Mrs. Ed.
