## FIVE PEOPLE BURNED TO DEATH NEAR CAMPBELLTON

### CLERGY AND DOCTORS SUPPORT ATHLETIC PROJECT.

### C.N.R. Considers Dalhousie as Possible Location For Big Tourist Hotel

#### FOUR YOUNG CHILDREN AND SERVANT GIRL PERISH IN FIRE AT MALTEMQUE

House and Barns of Adelard Savoie Destroyed in Blaze Which Broke out About 10 O'clock Last Night—Occupants Trapped in Upper Part of House and Escape Cut off by Flames—Contents of Building Lost.

Campbellton, Feb. 28.—Grim tragedy visited the home of Adelard Savoie at Maltemque about eight miles from here last night when four young children and a servant girl—names unknown—perished in a fire which broke out in the Savoie home at about ten o'clock, completely destroying the house and outbuildings.

News of the appalling tragedy reached here late last night. It is understood that Mr. and Mrs. Savoie were out when the fire was first discovered. The four children all too young to be expected to act calmly in such an emergency were trapped in the upper story of the house. The servant who was in charge of the children at the time doubtless made every effort to save herself and the others and it is believed that the blaze was not discovered until the flames in their rapid progress had cut off all avenues of escape from the building.

The Savoie house is located in a somewhat isolated section of the country and before neighbors became aware of the fire the flames had progressed so far as to make a rescue of the victims impossible.

The fire spread rapidly to the barn and outbuildings and these together with their contents, consisting of hay and farm machinery were totally destroyed. The cause of the fire is a mystery but it is thought that it may have originated from defective chimney flues.

The four youthful victims of the tragedy are the four eldest sons of Mr. and Mrs. Savoie. The name of the fifth victim, who was employed as a servant in the house, is not definitely known.

#### RAILWAY OFFICIAL IN SHIRETOWN IN CONNECTION WITH SUMMER HOTEL

Has Lengthy Interviews With Ex-Mayor W. S. Montgomery and Hon. C. H. LaBilbois, Vice-President of New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association—Two Fine Sites are Available.

Dalhousie, Feb. 28.—That the Railway authorities are giving careful consideration to the selection of an appropriate site for a large tourist hotel on the north shore is confirmed by the visit to the Shiretown of Restigouche this week of Mr. Frank L. Dougan, Travelling Passenger Agent for the Canadian National Railway (Eastern Lines).

On his arrival here on Monday evening Mr. Dougan had a lengthy interview with Hon. C. H. LaBilbois, Vice-President for Restigouche Co. of the New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association. In conference with ex-Mayor W. S. Montgomery with whom he spent Tuesday, Mr. Dougan was shown the several attractive locations for a summer hotel here and made acquainted with the many natural facilities which offer themselves so invitingly for a project of this kind.

Many letters from city people giving their opinion of Dalhousie as a summer resort for health and pleasure seekers were placed in the hands of the official.

Besides the site of the famous old Inch Arden Hotel, which is available, there is a second site to the west end of the town, close to an eastern exposure and with sufficient ground to provide for golf links, tennis courts, etc. The Government "Grand National" road passes this site. Both locations are about an equal distance to the town proper which has been so much improved since Dalhousie former days of summer tourist activity prior to the loss of the Inch Arden Hotel.

Mr. Dougan's efforts were careful to make the visitor familiar with these various improvements which include new water, electric light and telephone systems and extensive improvements in permanent sidewalks.

Dalhousie's great harbour, with its possibilities which are all too often unused, was also the subject of much comment. This fine expanse of sheltered water, large enough to harbor the British fleet, has been improved by the construction of a great breakwater, ferry and railway wharves, considerable dredging. Its natural attractions of beautiful scenery and bathing, boating and fishing facilities were also spoken of with pride and justly so for they are unsurpassed by those of any part of the Dominion.

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#### SUGGEST CAMPING GROUND HERE

Would Induce Tourists to Spend Time Here—Ask Salary Increases

A meeting of the Town Council was held Friday evening, His Worship Mayor McKay presiding. Couns. Armstrong, Cool, Moores, McDonald, Savage, Ramsay and Caldwell were present.

The minutes of previous meetings were read and approved.

The Town Solicitor, in reply to an inquiry in reference to the demand of the Restigouche Municipal Council for fifteen per cent of all dog taxes collected in Campbellton, stated that the law states this must be paid—Ordered filed.

Chief of Police Adams wrote asking for \$10.00 per month increase of pay, and Officer Smith asked for \$15.00 per month increase—Referred to the Police and License Committee.

Chief of Police Adams submitted an account for \$112.25 for collecting non-resident licenses. Referred to the Police and License Committee.

The usual departmental accounts were ordered paid.

The revised by-laws of the Fire Brigade were referred to the Fire Protection Committee.

Coun. McDonald of the Electric Light Committee moved that the Town Solicitor be instructed to prepare the necessary legislation authorizing the town to issue debentures not exceeding \$50,000 for the extension of the electric power plant—Carried.

There was some discussion as to the type of engine which would best serve the town if no action had been taken, but no action was taken, as it is hoped the N. E. Hydro Commission may be able to deliver current in Campbellton soon.

Coun. Moores brought up the matter of settlement with property owners for right of way for water main for new water service.

Coun. Moores moved that the Water and Sewerage Committee instruct the engineer in conjunction with the town solicitor to wind up all those outstanding claims—Carried.

Coun. Savage of the Water and Sewerage Committee said he understood that in most cases the agreements were prepared and signed. However he would look into the matter.

Coun. Moores said that when the appointments were made at a recent meeting an application for the position of building inspector by Mr. DeChene was not received. No doubt this had been overlooked.

To set this matter right Coun. Moores moved that the motion appointing the Building Inspector be reconsidered and that all applications for the position be referred to the Council at the next meeting—Carried.

Coun. Moores asked if a time limited or stated salary had been set for the assessors.

His Worship—No.

Coun. Moores moved that the same conditions apply as last year, viz. that the assessing should not exceed forty days at \$5.00 per day—Carried.

Coun. Armstrong moved that the Assessment and Appeals and the Finance committees take up all matters relating to the J. & D. A. Harquail Co., agreement and accounts and endeavor to arrive at a settlement—Carried.

Coun. Ramsay asked re the O'Leary assessment and claim.

His Worship explained that this was a very lengthy matter. The matter was all on record and should be cleared up.

Coun. Moores moved that the Finance committee take up the matter and have same straightened out as soon as possible—Carried.

Coun. Savage asked if the Water and Sewerage Committee had authority to revise the water rates.

His Worship—The committee has power to revise such rates and submit same to Council.

Coun. Moores brought up the matter of a tourist camping ground. He suggested that the Councilors give this matter their best thought, and offer suggestions. Such a camping ground would mean much to the town if properly advertised.

Coun. Moores moved that the Education and Improvement Committee make a recommendation—Carried.

The Council then adjourned.

OCEAN LIMITED DELAYED

#### MAKE FORCEFUL STATEMENTS ON IMPORTANCE OF ATHLETIC MOVEMENT

Accumulated Opinion of Local Clergymen and Doctors Most Encouraging—All Stand Behind Sport Project Which was Begun Here Last Summer in Hope that the Undertaking Made be Carried Through to a Fitting Success.

With the frank encouraging statements of local clergymen and doctors which appear below and the natural sense of awakening which attends the approach of spring it is probable that the temporarily discontinued efforts of the promoters of the athletic movement here may soon be revived and carried on to a successful completion. Although the numerous reverses with which the supporters of the sport project were confronted last fall contrived to greatly delay the consummation of their plans there is little doubt but what the formation of an all-round Athletic Association here is still being eagerly looked forward to by all those who so clearly manifested their interest last season, and with a renewal of effort in this undertaking there can be little doubt as to the final outcome of the movement.

The statements below, made by local men of recognized prominence who are familiar with practically every phase of our community life are indeed significant. It is seldom indeed that prominent citizens declare themselves so forcibly in favor of any local enterprise and these frank expressions of their opinion comprises a rather exceptionally favorable ground-work for promoters of the movement to base their subsequent organization upon. Their accumulated opinions touch on various phases of the undertaking and suggest many of the potential benefits of this splendid movement.

A Good Start

It is encouraging to know that those behind the sport movement here have not considered the matter hopeless in spite of the many obstacles which beset their efforts last season. The winter is not over, but it will be well to get the proposed association properly organized and the field question and other matters disposed of early in the season so that when summer arrives the stage will be set for the actual operation of this new body which can be made a power for good in a growing town like Campbellton.

Following are the statements of the different clergymen and doctors who have declared themselves heartily in sympathy with the movement. To all those interested in the promotion of good clean sport in all its various branches, these statements will be most encouraging:

Rev. Father Melanson

Frankly speaking, I am not fully acquainted with the objective or the rules and regulations of the proposed Athletic Club so am not in a position to give any detailed statement but as far as the general idea of the promotion of good clean sport and athletic training is concerned I believe it a splendid thing. I do not find time to follow up matters of this nature now but in my younger days I was always a sport enthusiast. If this project is gone ahead with I will follow its progress with interest.

Rev. F. E. Boothroyd

I believe in sport. While of course sport is not the only or chief interest in life and it should not be treated as though it was, recreation has an undoubted place in the divine order of things. Sport, rightly directed and free from gambling and unreasonableness, tends to give a man a vigorous and wholesome body, a sharp and balanced judgment and a fair and generous disposition. And this is all done in the game, not in the play.

"Play up, play up, and play the game."

For my part, I shall be glad to see an end to the hesitations and indecision in this project for an Athletic Club and the accomplishment of something positive and progressive.

Rev. A. Brock Humphreys

I have been asked to give my opinion as a clergyman as to the value of an Athletic Association, but I would rather look back in thought to my boyhood days. As I look back I realize there was a tremendous educational value in our sports and that we learned as much that is valuable in life on the "playing field" as in the "class room". It has been said with a great deal of truth that "The battle of Waterloo was won on the playing fields of Eaton." Lessons of self control, courage and fairness were inculcated in our sports.

Every child should be taught to play and to play fair. I think there is little value either morally or physically, in paying to watch others play our games for us.

Our Athletic Club should aim in conjunction with our School Board in providing suitable grounds and sportsmanlike instructors for this purpose. Such an effort would be a boon in our town.

Dr. J. J. MacPherson

I believe that Campbellton should have an Athletic Association of some kind. I consider such an organization an invaluable asset to the young people of the town. No one is better able than a physician to discern the weaknesses in youth that frequently result from lack of proper exercise and regular habits. No doubt a well conducted and properly systematized incentive for young people to build stronger bodies and thus escape

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#### DELEGATION TO GRAND FALLS

At a meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade, Town Council and citizens held in the Town Hall last evening it was decided to send Messrs. A. C. Bellefleur, Geo. G. McKenney and J. Allan LeBlanc as a delegation from Campbellton to attend the banquet at Grand Falls Monday evening.

At this meeting it is expected the matter of Grand Falls hydro development will be up for discussion and plans made to back up any steps taken for the early beginning of this work.

#### BIG INDUSTRY FOR RESTIGOUCHE

A statement was made at the meeting held last evening, reputed to have come from Premier Vanier that a party of American Capitalists had made written application for Grand Falls power, delivered in Restigouche county. The amount of power asked for is between ten and fifteen thousand horsepower.

Readers of the Graphic will remember that we some time ago, stated that a large pulp and paper corporation was requesting this amount of power for a mill to be erected in Restigouche county.

Prospects for great developments look bright just as soon as power is available.

#### CAMPBELLTON HOCKEY TEAM TO TOUR NEW ENGLAND STATES

Local Hockey Club to Visit "The Hub" and Other New England Cities During a Two Weeks Hockey Trip—Team to be Strengthened by the Acquisition of Two Outside Players from Bathurst and Probably Chatham or Moncton.

The local hockey club is going to make a tour of the New England hockey centres during the month of March. The leading promoter of the scheme is Bill Mott who played defence on the local team this winter. Mr. Mott has just returned from a ten days trip to the States and reports that he has several engagements already booked and also is in communication with other hockey clubs who are anxious to meet the local team. Among the engagements already booked are two nights in Boston. This will be a great trip for the local boys and if Mr. Mott succeeds in getting the team together which he is now thinking of, Campbellton will be represented by one of the strongest if not the strongest teams which has ever visited the Eastern States. Every team which

has gone over the border from the Maritimes has made a name for itself and there is no doubt but that our team with the acquisition of a couple of players would be able to compete favourably with the best teams in New England.

Mr. Mott would not give out the names of the outside players for publication but it is rumored that the locals are going to be strengthened by a couple of players from Chatham and Bathurst.

Mr. Covey put his foot down on the first scheme of having an "All Star New Brunswick" team. He has finally consented to allow any club to undertake the trip as a club and they will be allowed to strengthen their roster by the addition of a few outside men.
