EXPLOSION AT WILLIAMSBURG.

Fire in a Shoe Manufactory—Panie Among WILLIAMSBURG, N.Y., March 26,-Shortly after 10 o'clock a heavy explosion and shows startled the neighborhood of Kentavenue and South Second-sirest. Hundreds of people rushed from their dwellings and places of business, many believing the accompanying shock to have been caused by earthquakes. It required but a few minutes to show that the disaster was of a much more serious nature. An explosion had occurred on the first flow of the Eureka Shoe Manufacturing Company, located at the corner of the streets mentioned, and was followed by an outbreak of fire. Forty-five hands are employed in the factory and the greatest excitement ensued.

Screams and curses mingled with the roar of the flames. Some worked their way through the dense smoke to the windows which they broke open and from which they jumped to the street. A number of the girls were saved in this manner, but many of them were badly injured by falling to the sidewalk below.

The flames were gradually gotten under control, and when the rescued ones were looked over it was found that one remained unaccounted for.
