SHILA, March 31.—Further particulars received from the scene of the Manipur massacre show the insurgent tribes have captured a number of prisoners, including the Rajah of Manipur, whose capture is a powerful claimant of Assam as the cause of all the present trouble.

The insurgents have also captured Chief Commissioner Quinton, P. G. Grimwood, the political agent at Manipur, and Col. Skene, who commanded the detachment from the 4th and 5th regiments of the British army, which were the camp of the commissioner, may have escaped. Mrs. Grimwood, the wife of the political agent, two assistant-commissioners and one of the officers of the 4th and 5th regiments of the British army, who were captured in the direction of Shilong when the insurgents made the final charge upon the camp. The fate of the remaining officers is still unknown. Four regiments have already started for Manipur with the object of effecting the release of the prisoners and punishing the rebellious tribes. These regiments include two native regiments which were in garrison at Assam. AN ARAB REVOLUTION
Three Hundred People Massacred in the Comoro Islands.

LONDON, March 31.—News has come to this city from Zanzibar of the outbreak of a revolution in the Comoro Islands, in the Mozambique Channel, about 350 miles north-west of the Madagascar coast.

On the island of Anjouan the natives, after the death of the Sultan, supplanted themselves with arms and spread over the country, massacring 300 people and carrying off 1000 women and children.
