RESIDENTIAL TELEPHONES. There is a strong kick being made against the price the Bell Telephone Co. demands for a phone in a private residence. They force those who have them to pay \$25, the same figure they get from a business firm, though a house phone is not used one-tenth as often as one in a mercantile establishment. Families who would like a phone, have not taken one on account of the exorbitant price asked by the Bell people. In defiance, the company says it gives Waterloo connection free and must therefore have \$25 a phone. It would pay the company to reduce the price of their house phones to \$10 or \$12. This would be a fair figure, would lead to three times as many phones being put into homes and would pay the company well. The council should grant no concession until the company comes down to a reasonable basis for all its services and residential phones in particular.

THE CONCILIATION BILL.

intended to Help to Prevent Strikes and Lock-Outs. A Department of Labor, similar to the Ontario Bureau of Industries, is to be established to Gather Labor Information to be Given to the Public—Prohibition to Come Up in the House on Tuesday—The Public Health.

Ottawa, June 28.—The most important bit of Government legislation this year was introduced yesterday morning by Hon. William Mulock. It was the long-proposed Conciliation Act to aid in settling trade disputes and to provide for the publication of industrial statistics.

Hon. Mr. Mulock introduced his Conciliation Act and said that the bill proposed by the aid of conciliation to promote the settlement of trade disputes and differences that might arise between employers and employees. The bill would help to prevent strikes and lockouts. It was intended to establish a department of labor. It would be the duty of this department to gather labor information to be given to the public.

Mr. Mulock declined to talk, because it was not usual to discuss the merits of a bill upon its first reading. Pressed, however, he said the bill dealt with trade disputes, and anything of that nature would come within its purview.

Mr. Foster criticized the Government for its tardiness in introducing the bill. He said that the bill was not introduced until it was too late in the session to be of any use.

THE FOREIGN LEGATIONS

Were Ordered to Leave Peking in Twenty-Four Hours. Ministers Now With Admiral Seymour. Extended Eight Miles From Tien Tsin—The News Confirmed From German and Chinese American Sources—An Escort Out of the City Furnished—News Given to Imperial Commons.

THE COLONY TRADE.

Mr. Ritchie says a Measure of Reciprocity, With the colonies would be Practicable. London, June 28.—On the resumption yesterday of the session of the Association of Chamber of Commerce of the United Kingdom, the president of the Board of Trade, Mr. T. Ritchie, addressed the delegates. Referring to Tuesday's discussion of commercial relations, he said he believed the days of the strict Manchester free trade school were passing. The remark was greeted with applause. Mr. Ritchie explained that he did not wish to infer that Great Britain was likely to abandon her trade policy, but thought that, without departing from the fundamental principle, there might be arranged a closer reciprocal connection between the Motherland and the colonies.

BIG BLAZE AT ST. CATHARINES.

Lumber Yard of Messrs. Wilson & Co. Nearly Destroyed. St. Catharines, Ont., June 28.—About 10:15 o'clock yesterday forenoon, the heat from the furnace in the rear of Messrs. Hennehan's residence, and before it was scarcely discovered, the flames had leaped into one of the large lumber piles of Wilson & Co. The fire had a strong foothold before the firemen were able to get to work. The heat from the fire was something terrific. Several of the men were prostrated, and compelled to retire. This is the fourth fire this firm has had in the last two months. The other three were of incendiary origin, and the fire yesterday looks like another attempt.
