Re Surplus Stock of Flour

The Nova Scotia Committee of the Canada Food Board has received official notification from Ottawa that the regulations requiring the return to dealers of surplus stocks of flour have been amended as follows:

A bona fide farmer shall be permitted to hold, subject to the order of the Canada Food Board the amount of flour, made wholly or in part from wheat, he may have in his possession in excess of the amount prescribed by the Order, if on or before the 15th day of June, 1918, he reports to the miller or dealer from whom it was purchased or by whom it was manufactured, the excess amount held by him. It shall then be the duty of such miller or dealer to report all such holdings to the Canada Food Board on forms to be supplied and at such times as he is directed.

Any person holding or having in his possession not more than 25 pounds of flour made wholly or in part from wheat, or who holds or has in his possession at the date hereof part only of the original package in which such flour was purchased, though the amount exceed 25 pounds, shall be permitted to hold the same.

The federal parliament was prorogued at Ottawa Thursday night.

All young men of nineteen must register before June 1st under the conditions of the recent amendment to the M. S. Act.

Canadian women will probably soon be enlisted as members of the Royal Air Force branches. They will be employed as chauffeurs.

The funeral services were conducted from his late home yesterday afternoon with interment at West Paradise, beside his father and mother. The services were conducted by Rev. D. K. Grant, pastor of the Presbyterian church, assisted by Rev. M. S. Richardson, pastor of the Bridgetown Baptist church.

Death of George L. Hannington

Mr. George L. Hannington, of Shediac, N. B., a former resident of Bridgetown, died in Middleton Saturday, aged 68 years.

He was a well known hotel keeper, both at Shediac and Sydney before coming to Bridgetown. He was a member of the Church of England and took a deep interest in public affairs.

Mr. Hannington spent the better part of last summer visiting relatives and friends in Cape Breton and shortly after arriving home was stricken with an illness from which he did not recover.
