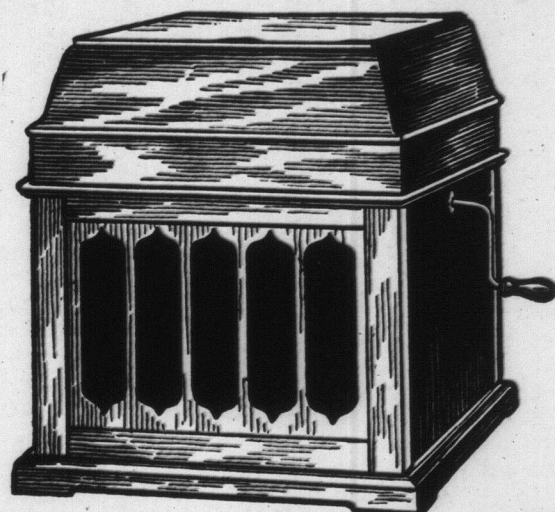
Belcher's Almanac
