scarcely anything doing, and what has been weak and neglected. White and red lying north and west have been repeatedly offered at 75c. per bushel, but not taken; new wheat has been offered at 73c.; No. 1 Manitoba hard wanted at 79c. North Bav. No. 2 hard, to arrive at Sarnia, offered at 87¹/₂c. (Montreal freight) with 87c. bid. No. 3 hard is quoted at 77c. North Bay No. 1 regular offered at 50c. Fort William, and No. 2 regular offered at 40c., with bids of 35c.;

street receipts have been small; 78c. has been paid for fall and 66c. for goose. Oats have been inactive all the week at 33 to 34c; a couple of cars sold yesterday at 34c., mixed on track; a car of white to arrive sold also at 34c.; oats are quoted at 31c. outside. Barley is quite nominal and is neither offered nor apparently wanted. A sale of new on the street was reported at 41½c., and this about comprised the business for the week. The stocks of grain in store at Port Arthur on Aug. 11th were 641,775 bushels. During the week there was received 89,656 bushels, and shipped 157.081 bushels, leaving in store on the 18th inst. 674,351 bushels.
