

8. To consider the possibility of co-operation in social education.
9. To consider the possibility of co-operation in education in rural communities.
10. To consider the possibility of co-operation in the financial problems of education expansion.
11. To consider in general the holding of conferences of experts from Commonwealth countries and in particular the holding of conferences of experts on the following subjects:
 - (a) school buildings;
 - (b) the teaching of science and mathematics;
 - (c) the use of audio-visual aids including television in education.

Notes for Editors

The first Commonwealth Education Conference was held at Oxford in July 1959 as a result of an initiative taken by Canada at the Commonwealth Trade and Economic Conference held at Montreal in September 1958. The Oxford Conference recommended that, to sustain the momentum of the new drive in co-operation which it believed it had initiated, another Commonwealth Education Conference should subsequently be convened to take stock of the progress made in the intervening period and to make further plans for the future.
