My dear Mr. King:-

I am enclosing you herewith a copy of a letter which I recently wrote to Mr. Graham and a copy of his reply. I might say that I wrote to him as I was given to understand that arrangements of this nature were being made by him, and I did not want to bother you with them unnecessarily.

I have felt for some time that it was rather ridiculous to invite public men to come to various clubs, and ask them to speak on non-contentious matters, when all vital national matters are contentious.

It would be not only a pleasure but a great honor to our Mc Gill Canadian Club to hear you speak in the McGill Union. We could, I think, be quite certain of a large attendance of the staff and undergraduates, and we would be glad to allow as many of the public as could be accommodated to come. The room holds about one thousand.

I do hope that it will be possible for you to come and give our undergraduates a political speech. If you could give us some indication of the week or weeks in which you might find it convenient to address the students, I will be glad to give you the list of free dates during this period.
