ALBANIANS RETIRE BEFORE THE SERBS

Desperate Fighting Between Contending Forces Results Disastrously to Former.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—(Can. Press)—"The Albanians are falling back along the line," says The Daily Telegraph's

Belgrade correspondent. "After desperate fighting the Serbian troops have entered Struga, six miles from Ochrid, having cleared that territory and scattered the Albanians, who evidently are over the River Drin being cut. The damage done by the Albanians is enormous.

"Believing that the Serbian abandonment of Yumukala heralded a general retreat, the Albanians attacked vigorously in front of Pristina, only to be decimated by the Serbian fire, which was reserved until the enemy was within 200 yards of their trenches. Panic-stricken, the Albanians retreated to the four winds.

Marshmallow Gingerbread. Cream one-half cupful of sugar with one-half cupful of butter. Add one-half cupful of molasses and one-half cupful of hot water, in which there is one teaspoonful of soda. Beat the mixture thoroughly, and add one beaten egg and one-half teaspoonful of ginger. Continue stirring, and add one and one-half cupful of flour. Bake in a shallow pan. These gingerbread should not be over one inch thick. Remove it from the pan and cut it over.

Sweet Potatoes. Butter a baking dish well; cut sweet potatoes into slices or cubes and put them into the dish in layers, sprinkled slightly with brown sugar, and alternated with layers of sliced apples. When the dish is full, put butter, pepper and salt on top, and add enough water to keep the contents from burning. Bake in a moderate

WESTERN PIONEER HAS PASSED AWAY

T. W. Robinson Built Up Canadian West's Best Known Business.

HAD LIVED IN TORONTO For Several Years, But Retained His Interest in Commerce.

In the death of T. W. Robinson at his late residence, 124 Bedford road, Toronto, on Thursday last, one of the pioneer merchants of Moose Jaw, Sask., passed away. Mr. Robinson was born in Newmarket in 1848 and his business life began with the old firm of Thos. Thompson & Sons, King street east, Toronto, about the year 1870. In 1874 he went west to Winnipeg, where he was with Stobart, Eden & Co., and afterwards with Messrs. J. Robinson & Co., finally moving west to Moose Jaw, Sask., where his business life on his own account began in a small one-story building. This was in 1882. By 1889 the business had doubled in volume and again in 1893. From that date until the present, there has been a steady expansion in his business enterprise, until at the present time his firm is one of the most important in the Canadian west.

Mr. Robinson had always been known by those who associated with him in business as a man of the highest honor, keen in business, but generous and considerate in all his dealings. While for some years past he made his home in Toronto, he still retained control of the Moose Jaw business and it was a matter of justifiable pride for him to watch the expansion of the fine business he founded, from year to year, a business for the success of which he alone was responsible. In the Canadian west, there are few men possessing the ability, courage and tenacity of purpose to win success as he did, starting without capital, and in the end leaving a business second to none in the smaller cities of the west.

Mr. Robinson was a member of St. Ives MacFarland, New York City, and also took a very active part in the interests of St. John's Church, Moose Jaw, Sask., where for many years he was church warden. He was a prominent member of the Masonic lodge, being past master of St. John's lodge, Moose Jaw, and also a popular and honored member of the National Club, Toronto.

Mr. Robinson leaves a wife and six daughters, Mrs. Rawlin, Lewises, Moose Jaw, Sask.; Mrs. Edwin P. Morden, of Cairo, Illinois; the Misses Daisy, Marie, Lorraine and Nora, at home, also a brother, Alfred Robinson, of South Bend, Washington, and a sister, Mrs. Robert Burns of Winnipeg.
