A spoonful of lard or butter or flour or anything means a spoon filled and rounded over with as much above the bowl as in it. A level spoon of salt or spice requires that the material in the spoon be leveled off with a knife.

A triple measuring spoon is a new convenience that helps to uniform results on baking day; it consists of large, small and half-size teaspoons fastened together at the top of the handle with a pivot. A tablespoon of liquid weighs half an ounce.

A tablespoon of solid matter an ounce. A teaspoon of flavoring extract will flavor a quart of liquid.
