OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—It is predicted that the Dominion's revenue for the present year will show an increase of at least \$2,000,000 over last September. This will be due chiefly to a substantial increase in the customs revenue, resulting from larger imports. The fact that a record harvest in the west is now assured has improved business conditions considerably, and there is a corresponding expansion of import trade.

The business improvement also reduces the prospect of trouble from unemployment. Considering as well that more than 160,000 men have been taken from business and industry to go on active service, and that immigration has fallen from 402,000 to 144,000 per annum, it is expected that there will be no great amount of unemployment this autumn and winter.

NOTHING OBJECTIONABLE.
The statement of a colored delegation protesting on behalf of the young men's guild of the Methodist Episcopal Church against the showing of D. W. Griffith's famous film spectacle, "The Birth of a Nation," at the Alexandra Theatre next week was shown to Mr. W. Cranston, manager of that attraction. In response to their protest he claims that the delegation have been misinformed about this wonderful picture. "The picture," he explained, "is the birth of the American nation, and in order to show the effect of the civil war, Mr. Griffith has used part of Thomas Dixon's book, 'The Birth of a Nation,' in order to show the difficulty of the reconstruction period of the south after the war, and in no way casts an unfavorable light upon the present day negro.

Following the acquittal of Vice-President Dickson of the International Railway, Attorney-General Lucas' department is contemplating instituting renewed action against the company. For several days Hon. Mr. Lucas has reported that there is nothing in the language with regard to the Quenson accident, but admitted that indictment of the company was a possibility.
