hundred to one but they would find themfelves miftaken, and be obliged to get three fourths of the church men and differents deprived of *their* right of voting alfo, before his party could have the leaft hopes of gaining their point: for the generality of all the different perfuasions are in the fame way of thinking, and act on the fame principles with those of the Quakers.

The three remaining articles relate to the inflruction of the Germans; and feem to be inferted rather for a glofs to his plan than any thing elfe, as they are in effect contained in the fcond. All that is new in them, relates to having all bonds, contracts, wills and other legal writings made in the English tongue; and that no news papers, almanacks, or other periodical paper fhould be printed in a foreign language, at leaft, unlefs an English version be printed in the oppolite column or page of which two cautions are certainly proper and neceffary, excepting that the article which relates towills, may require fome mitigation.

Thus haveing gone thro' the writer's letter, article by article, it remains only to take notice of what he fays in the two or three laft paragraphs. In the first of them, p. 43, he fays that " during " the late war, they (he means those of his par-" ty) petitioned his Majesty, fetting forth their " difficulties and the defenceless state of the pro-" vince, but received no relief; owing, as they " prefumed, to the other weighty affairs, which " then engroffed the attention of the ministry."

Now this is notorioufl/ falfe, and a reflection on his Majefty as well as his ministers: for upon an application for that purpose, the Otter floop of war, captain Baladine was fent out to their aid and defence. She arrived and was in the port of Philadelphia
