their worthy Champion, are in much more comfortable Situations; but, as it muft be allowed he is an ingenious Man, we cannot fuppole him in Earnest in this Sort of Objection. His Irony is very nice and bordering on the Obscure; and People are fometimes apt to mistake him: but I will answer for it, that a moderate Pension would induce him to own all he has written to be in that Strain; and I expect, when the Jeft is discovered to happily, that he will allow me fomething out of it, for the Hint?
