

At the conclusion of the meeting, I accompanied Canon Williams to the train, and we took our seats for Ryhl, to attend another meeting at half-past 6 o'clock. The attendance was large and highly respectable. I was obliged to speak again, though under very great difficulty, in consequence of the continued soreness of my throat, which the effort at the former meeting had not improved. I obtained, however, from parties at the meetings £5 18s. 6d., for the College.

I received a very kind note from Mrs. Hamilton on behalf of the Bishop, reminding me of the meeting of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel at Salisbury, on the 8th, and inviting me to the Palace. The Bishop informed me, that the Archbishop of York, and the Bishop of Oxford were to give their valuable assistance.

I was, however, obliged reluctantly to give up this second visit to Salisbury, in consequence of prior engagements in North Wales.

Friday, September 9.—Bade the Venerable Bishop of St. Asaph good-bye, and accompanied Canon Williams in his carriage to Nannerch, Mold. We reached the Rectory shortly after 2 o'clock, having driven about fifteen miles through a part of the bold, yet charming scenery of North Wales. Mrs. Williams had been expecting us, and had a very excellent dinner provided for us, which was very acceptable after our long drive.

Sunday, September 11.—Immediately after breakfast, Canon Williams sent me in his Brougham, with two of his sons, to Ruthin, in the lovely Vale of Clwyd, some fifteen miles from Nannerch, where he had arranged that I should preach in behalf of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, in St. Peter's Church. This church is a very old one, and perhaps the old carved oaken ceilings, so highly illuminated, of the north aisle, are as fine as any in England. I was obliged to hasten back, as I had to preach a second time in St. Mary's Church, of which Canon Williams is the Rector, in behalf of Trinity College.

Monday, September 12.—I drove with Canon Williams to Hawarden Rectory, adjoining Hawarden Castle, of which the Rev. Henry Glynnne, brother of Sir Stephen R. Glynnne, is the Rector, to attend a meeting of the clergy of that neighbourhood.
