*Dear Friend,*—Francis desires your acceptance of a token of his regard and our gratitude for your kindness to him. He will bring some inscriptions for it which the time has not permitted me to have executed. Most truly yours, J. G. SIMCOE.  
Jan., 1801."

The token was a handsome silver goblet or vase. "I have often seen it," Mrs. Simcoe adds, "on the table at Heath's Court, but I have only just obtained the words of the inscription from the present Lord Coleridge.
