WANTS A PUBLIC
UTILITIES
BOARD

Controller Church Will Again
Bring Up His Motion That
Legislation Be Applied For
To Provide for Change—
Proposed Sites for Buildings
at Exhibition Not Approved.

Controller Church stated yesterday
at the meeting of the board of con-
trol that he would again bring up
his motion to the effect that legisla-
tion be sought to create a public util-
ities board out of the present civic
hydro-electric commission.

Residents in the vicinity of Queen and
Berl streets were considerably alarmed
yesterday over the discovery of a

other water main catastrophe might re-
sult from what was apparently a break
in the pipe. The waterworks depart-
ment at the city hall were immediately
informed of the occurrence and an in-
vestigation followed. As it turned out,
however, the leakage was from a small
pipe running to an old stable on Berl
street, a pipe which had been out of
commission for some years. The break,
which was found to be between the stop
cock and the main, was immediately
repaired by the department.

SPiegel CASE
IS CONCLUDED

Prisoner Collapsed and Wept
When Counsel Referred
to His Wife and
Children.

"What am I to assume when evidence
goes to show that Spiegel was seen to
leave his premises within a few min-
utes of the first outbreak of fire?"
Judge Denton, presiding at the Spiegel
arson trial, interrupted J.W. Curry's
eloquent plea for his client yesterday
afternoon.

Thursday's session of the court was
taken up mostly by addresses of counsel
in the case.

Mr. Curry, pleading for the abso-
lution of the prisoner, placed a number
of business men on the stand to testify
as to the good character of Spiegel in
the community.

Counsel for the defence went into the
most minute details of the case and
waxed very dramatic in his description
of the prisoner's wife and family, who
would be in a sorry plight should the
court deem it wise to convict him. At
this point Spiegel, who had hitherto sat
tense and motionless for hours at a
time as the trial proceeded, broke down
completely, the tears running into his
eyes as he shrunk into his chair.

The sight of Spiegel's collapse seemed
to electrify the Hebrew portion of the
spectators, who filled every chair in the
rear of the court room. With a cran-
ing of necks and gasped whispers, each
expressed his individual opinion to his
neighbor.

Collision of Stars and Birth of New
Planets.

There is good reason to believe that
the collision of two stars, luminous and
dead—occasionally fall together, and
conception of such an event was given
by Professor A. W. Bickerton in a late
Royal Institute lecture.

The collisions do not come at random.
Gravity and other agencies are at work,
and before two stars collide they come
into each other's sphere for hundreds
of years, being drawn toward each
other with constantly increasing speed.

As the velocity would be proportion-
ate to size, the collision would take
place in a sorry plight—about three-
fourths of an hour—for all bodies. With
the collision, the two stars become a
new one, the tremendous speed is sud-
denly converted into heat, and the ex-
plosive force expands the new star at
the rate of millions of miles an hour.

This Professor Bickerton believes ex-
plains the origin of the sun, and the
suddenly flashed out in 1901 with 10,
000 times the brilliancy of our sun. The
new star became the brightest in the
heavens except Sirius, and was the most
brilliant new star that has appeared
in 300 years.
