CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE CAUSED WOMAN'S DEATH
Martin Donnan, Truck Driver, Convicted at Assizes, But Sentence Deferred.

Found guilty on the charge of criminal negligence, and doing bodily harm, but strongly recommended to the jury, Martin Donnan, driver of the Collins Motor Truck Co., was remanded until this morning for sentence by Chief Justice Sir Glenholme Beveridge. The charge was laid against Donnan yesterday, T. C. Robinson, K.C., was counsel for the defence, and Thomas A. Agar of Simcoe was the crown prosecutor.

Evidence was given to show that on the night of the accident, which resulted in the death of Mrs. Ellen Burrey, a hundred yards east of the intersection of St. Clair and Shaw a few minutes before the accident occurred, was of the opinion that the car was going at the rate of 22 miles an hour when it passed him.

WILLS PROBATED.
Almost \$600,000 was the amount of the estate left by the late John Auld, manufacturer, who died in Montreal on March 30. Of this amount \$276,750 was real estate in Montreal itself, and \$324,248 in numerous shares, \$10,440 being in the Toronto Street Railway. The will provides for small legacies to various public institutions. Mrs. Margaret J. Baker, a niece, inherits nearly a twentieth of the estate, the residue, \$537,254 being divided between 12 employees, seven friends and 24 relatives.

W. J. Joyce, who died in Los Angeles in 1915, left an estate valued at \$14,000. Albert J. Bradley has petitioned for appointment as guardian of his daughter, Rose Merrill Bradley, who inherits \$800 of the estate. Carlotta K. Meredith, who died on Oct. 4, left her estate, \$6000, to a number of relatives.

Other estate listed yesterday were those of Isabella E. Underwood, \$219, Louise E. Sewell, \$3504, and Joseph Fracasso, \$285.
