Wholesale Robbery of Graves. Indianapolis, Sept. 29.—Wholesale robbery of graves in the cemeteries about Indiana, which has been going on for some time, was brought to a close early this morning by the arrest of a gang of seven negroes. Warrants were issued also against a number of white men.

Used a Penknife in Fight. Frank Whitman furnished a penknife at his home 174 Grace street, on Monday night in a quarrel with his wife and the knife was found in the pocket of the woman's face and arm. Mrs. Whitman was taken to Police-man Crooke and arrested on a charge of wounding.

Guards to Be Kept on. Pekin, Sept. 29.—The restoration to the Chinese of the Peking-Hankow Railway, with the consent of the allies, fails to seem to the Chinese. The guards who are keeping open the line of communication from Peking to the sea, will be retained indefinitely.

First Football Fatality. Sioux Falls, S.D., Sept. 29.—Harry Jordan of Sioux Falls died from injuries received in a football game here last Thursday.

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Arrests at the Woodbine. William R. Neale of Windsor sealed the fence at the Woodbine on Monday, and was arrested by Constable Boardman, Chief Smith of Chilliack, Ohio, was taken into custody by Detective Black. He is charged with vagrancy.
