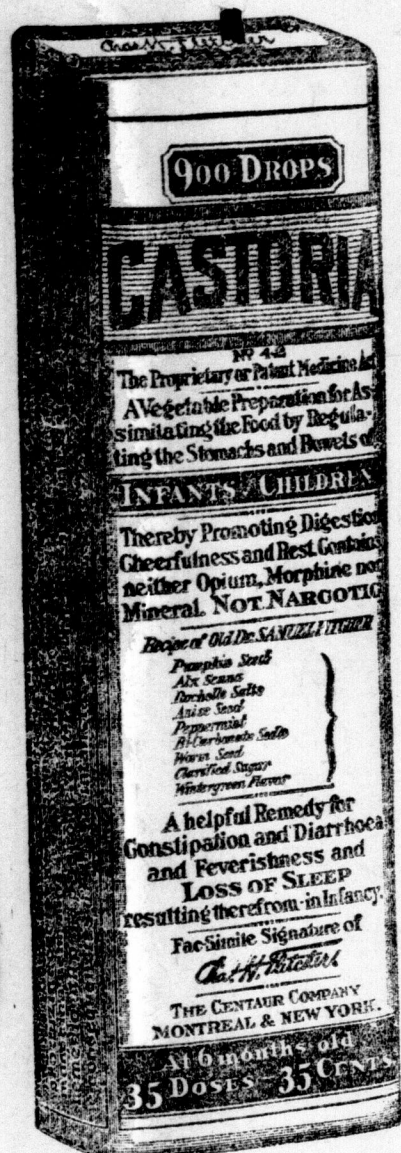

Several Killed in Food Riots in Glogau, Silesia

Troops Called Out To Quell Disturbances—Machine Guns Used.

BERLIN, Sept. 10.—Ten persons were killed and eleven wounded during food riots in Glogau, Silesia, Tuesday. Troops used machine guns and hand grenades against the rioters.

The trouble started when threatening crowds gathered before the shops and protested against the dearth of food. The situation became critical, and troops were called out.

The crowd attacked the soldiers, and one soldier was shot. Thereupon the order to fire was given, and the streets were cleared by the use of machine guns. The Austrian chancellor, an EI and hand grenades. The town is now quiet.

SAYS GREAT BRITAIN WANTS LION'S SHARE OF GERMAN SHIPPING

Will Insist On Having 2,250,000 of the 3,000,000 Tons To Be Divided.

LONDON, Sept. 11.—That Great Britain intends to insist upon having 2,250,000 tons of the 3,000,000 tons of the German shipping to be divided among the allies by the reparations commission after the ratification of the peace treaty, is the statement made to the Daily Mail by an official of the ministry of shipping, who added that the position was delicate and complicated and that intricate international negotiations were yet to be completed.

Mr. Robert Borden replied on January 2, 1919, recounting the steps he had taken, and how he had brought the matter up at the imperial war cabinet, which had accepted the recommendation made.

Mr. Rowell also read a memorandum prepared by Sir Robert Borden on behalf of the prime ministers of the dominions and circulated among the British Empire delegation. The memorandum was in connection with the position of the dominions in regard to the signing of the treaty. The recommendations contained therein were adopted except one.

Mr. Rowell told the House that the British ministry of shipping had agreed to the transfer of Canadian-owned ships now under British registry to Canadian registry, subject to the rights of the British Government.

Tremendous Losses. Dr. P. McGibbon, continuing the debate on the peace treaty resolution referred to in opening, to the tremendous losses in casualties and treasure resulting from the war just concluded, Canada, he said, having made great sacrifices in the war had the right to discuss the terms of peace and to assure herself that those things won for her on the battlefields of France were preserved at Versailles.

The building up of the new states in Europe and occupation of the Rhineland had surrounded Germany on every side, Mr. McGibbon went on.

The economic conditions were equally severe or more so, but the indemnity had caused the Allies such heavy war damages. The terms were such that no nation would carry them out unless she were absolutely compelled to do so, and in the League of Nations Mr. McGibbon saw the best chance of bringing to bear sufficient force.

BILL TO SUBSTITUTE ELECTROCUTION FOR HANGING INTRODUCED

Canada's Right To Discuss Terms of Peace.

DR. MCGIBBON'S VIEWS

Thinks Sacrifices Have Given Dominion Right To Have a Voice.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—Mr. Mowat of Parkdale in the House this afternoon presented his bill to substitute electrocution as a means of capital punishment. The bill was read a first time.

Mr. Rowell read correspondence which passed between Sir Thomas White, then acting premier, and Sir Robert Borden, at the time the latter was in London, in regard to Canadian representation at the peace conference.

The correspondence opened with a cable from Sir Thomas White to Sir Robert Borden on December 4, 1918. It emphasized that the cabinet council was strongly of opinion that Canada should be represented at the conference.

In view of Canada's war efforts, the cable continued, the council was of the opinion that the Dominion was entitled to representation, that the character of the British commonwealth, composed of Great Britain and other nations, under one sovereign should be recognized, and that provision should be made for special representation of these nations.

SIR SAM HUGHES HAS SHARP TILT WITH MEWBURN

Minister and Ex-Minister Clash at Guelph Novitiate Inquiry.

SESSION A TENSE ONE

Gen. Mewburn Shows Limited Knowledge of Instructions Issued.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 10.—Colonel Godson-Godson and Major-General Mewburn were the principal witnesses today at the session of the inquiry into the incident connected with the Guelph novitiate search, or "raid," as it has been variously described. From the standpoint of tenacity the session was the most interesting yet held. General Mewburn, called by Mr. Newcombe and sharply cross-examined at some length by Mr. Fergusson, counsel for the complainants, and Sir Sam Hughes, testified to the instructions sent from the militia department to Major Hirsch, assistant provost marshal of the London district, relative to the Guelph novitiate, and to the general surprise of those in court he appeared to possess but a limited knowledge of the instructions issued from this office.

The now celebrated "S. C. M." memorandum was identified by General Mewburn in the form in which it left his office en route to the department of Colonel Godson-Godson, but in the form in which it was alleged to have been received by Major Hirsch and as to the covering letter from Staff Captain Burroughs, containing the suggestion that the Guelph novitiate should be "cleaned up," the minister had no knowledge.

A Sharp Tilt. General Mewburn, a Sir Sam Hughes had a rather sharp tilt over the matter of the letter of apology sent to the rector of the novitiate by the minister of militia. Sir Sam asked the witness why he wrote it, particularly as it was written before he had received the report of Captain Macaulay, the officer who made the raid.

"I considered it the main thing to do, though you might regard it differently," replied the minister of militia. "Since you put it that way," rejoined Sir Sam, "I can say I never wrote an apology like that to anyone."

Colonel Godson-Godson was questioned particularly regarding the removal of the bureau's letter and the "S. C. M." memorandum from Major Hirsch's files at London. He said he removed some papers from that file and believed they were the ones referred to.

Blamed Macaulay. Major Hirsch was not in his office at the time, and he did not tell Major Hirsch the letters had been removed, and his omission in that respect being "intentional," Colonel Godson-Godson also testified at length concerning the investigation he conducted at the novitiate into the conduct of Captain Macaulay on the night of the raid. He blamed Captain Macaulay for visiting the institution in plain clothes instead of in uniform, and also for not producing the authority to search when it was demanded by Captain Father Hingston.

Major Hirsch, in conversation with Colonel Godson-Godson, took full responsibility for Captain Macaulay's conduct at Guelph and expressed the opinion that Macaulay had followed the instructions given to him. Colonel Godson-Godson was still under examination when the session adjourned until Thursday morning.
