Both choir and solo numbers were unusually fine, resulting altogether in a recital of great

Millicent Maginley has a soprand voice of clear, pure and resonant quality especially adapted to church music. She sings without restraint, pouring out her songs of praise like a bird. The recitation and Arla from Costa's "Eli," "I Will Extol Thee, O Lord," was her first number, and with desire for more, so excellently was it rendered. This was followed by Tschaikowsky's "Legend," a weird and beautiful air which keeps falling back upon one note and which she sang with skill and atristic finish, while "Father Eternal," her Bach-Gounod number, was perhaps one of the finest on the

was perhaps one of the finest on the program.

"Sound an Alarm," the mangnificent tenor solo from Handel's "Judas Maccabaeus," was the number in which Gladstone Brown was first heard. This English tenor has a voice with the characteristic soft quality of the old land, and yet a power which is rarely heard except in operatic singing. At the time of the Glpsy Smith campaign he was heard here in simple sacred airs. Last night his voice was shown off to advantage in such big numbers as "How Many Hired Servants." from Sullivan's "The Prodigal Son," "Requiem of the Sea" (Steppen), "The Lord Shall Wipe Away All Tears" (Bloye), and "Ave Maria" (Kahn), the latter number being sung with a dramatic force and religious feeling, which made it perhaps the rarest treat of the evening.

The tenor and soprano duet, sung by both artists, bringing a magnificent program to a close, was Mendelssohn's "My Song Shall Always Be of Thy Mercy," and was rendered in a manner which will not soon be forgotten.

The choir itself was in fine trim, responding readlly to the mood of the director, and some very fine effects in shading were obtained, especially in the negro spiritual number "Weeping Mary." (R. N. Dett) an exquisitely beautiful thing. A festive anthem. "The Strain Upraise." by H. E. Nichol, was a number which gave scope for some excellent choir work with its double quartette, chorus and soprano solo by Miss Ula Kennedy. "Ride On In Majesty," (Ashford) was another very fine ensemble number, while the closing rollicking song "O, Hail Us, Ye Free" ensemble number, while the closing rol-licking song "O, Hail Us, Ye Free" (Verdie), was perhaps the most de-lightful of all. Attacks and releases were made with precision, indicating that the choir was in excellent form.


