RULE RUSSIA

Alliance Is Likely To Direct East.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3. While the Japanese are extending their occupation of Siberia, the peaceful penetration of Russia by the Germans is proceeding apace, and it is with the Germans that the Japenese expect eventually to make terms, and perhaps eventually to make terms, and pernaps an alliance.

This is the information brought to Washington today by Col. Frank R. Blunt, the Chicago railway executive, who has just returned from two and a half years' service with John F. Stevens' American engineers corps in reorganizing and operating the Trans-Siberian Railroad, Col. Blunt left with Mr. Stevens in Harbin, Manchuria, a detailed report of his observations of actual conditions not only in Siberia but in Russia proper under the soviet regime.

"There is no blinking the fact that "There is no blinking the fact that Germany is actively engaged in paying the way to acquire domination of Russia," said Col. Blunt tonight. "During the two and a half years I spent in Siberia I witnessed the arrival of Germans in ever increasing numbers, and the same phenomenon attracted the attention of many other American railway men stationed at various railway men stationed at various points on the Trans-Siberian line."

"I also know that Germany's peaceful invasion of Siberia is greatly exceeded in extent by the same movement in Russia proper, into which I penetrated as far as 140 miles west of the Urals. GOATS' MILK COMING

PARIS. Nov. 1.—The constant decrease in France's cattle reserve has had the effect of restoring an industry which has been lost sight of, at least in the larger cities, for two generations, the vending of goats' milk.

Even the most aristocratic quarters of Paris are now being visited each morning by employees of a Montrouge goat herd, leading three or four of the milk-giving animals and offering as many litres as the customer may wish—and is willing to pay for.

The business is apparently a profitable one, despite the fact that goats now cost nearly twenty times as much as before the war. The milk is greatly sought for by mothers with sick children and costs 2 francs a litre (40 cents in normal currency). M.
