ALBANIAN VILLAGE COMPLETELY DESTROYED BY AN EARTHQUAKE; LARGE NUMBER OF LIVES LOST

Tidal Wave and Landslides En gulf Island of Saseno-Commander Pagliaro and 21 Others Are Victims-Hospital On Island Reported To Have Disappeared.

Rome, Dec. 18.-New earthquake shocks have completed the destruction of the Albanian village of Tepeleni, 32 miles southeast of Avlona, according to reports from Brindisi. Twenty-two persons are known to have lost their lives. Exact details of the situation have not been learned owing to the interruption of communications between Avlona and the stricken village. Serious earthquakes took place in the Tepeleni district early this month, an area of 40 square miles being shaken and many villages reduced to ruins.

Advices state that Commander Pagliaro, his two daughters, seventeen sailors and two non-commissioned officers lost their lives on the Island of Saseno, at the entrance of the Bay of Avlona, when the latest earthquake took place. The tremor was accompanied by a tidal wave, and landslides buried the house in which the commander lived. It is said the hospital on the Island of Saseno has disappeared.

MENDOZA CITY IS VIOLENTLY SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKE

Buenos Ayres, Dec. 18.—Mendoza city was shaken yesterday afternon at 3 o'clock by an earthquake, which was quite violent and lasted 30 seconds. The tremor was repeated with less intensity half an hour later. No details as to property damage have been received. The earthquake was also felt in the city of La Rioja, capital of the province of the same name, at 3:05 yesterday afternoon. There were no casualties there.

CHINA'S ATTITUDE

Will Reserve Important Questions for More Opportune Time.

Geneva, De 18.—Certain questions affecting international relations coming within the jurisdiction of the league of nations have near reserved by China for a more opportune occasion for bringing them to the attention of the council or assembly of the league, Dr. Weilington Koo, Chinese delegate to the assembly declared at this morning's session of the assembly. this morning's session of the assembly.

Representatives of Austria, Bulgaria. Luxembourg, Albania, Costa Rica and Finland, which have been made members of the league, had seats in today's meeting, but did not participate in the proceedings. It was impossible to secure the proper credentials in the short space of time which had intervened since these nations were accorded membership. The formal signing of the protocol by the representatives of a number of nations accepting jurisdiction of the international court was planned to be held at headquarters of the league secretariat this afternoon. The general conclusions of the mandate committee's report, which was awaited with much interest, were that the council of the league had adopted such a policy regarding mandates that there was no reason to discuss them publicly before they went into force: that the mandatory nations should not recruit soldiers in territories confided to them, nor profit from their trust in exploiting for their own benefit the natural resources of those territories. 
