ONLY FIVE ADMISSIONS FOR NEW ENGINEER

Barrow Comes Out Top After All—Suit to Quash Power Bylaw.

HAMILTON, Nov. 12.—(Special).—City Engineer Barrow came out on top at the city council meeting this evening, only the following five members voting for the appointment of a new city engineer: Ald. McLaren, Percival, Allan, Angus and Dickson. The mayor announced that he had assumed that the suit to quash the power bylaw entered into between the council and the Ontario Power Co. would be entered for trial at the next assizes which would open on Nov. 30, and the council agreed to wait until then before awarding the contract of the new waterworks pumps and motors. A resolution was passed authorizing the mayor and chairman of the finance committee to arrange all expenses not provided for by the committee of appropriation, and the mayor said he would live up to his instructions. Ald. Barrow complimented him for putting the strait-jacket on the board of works.

The markets committee withdrew its recommendation of an increase of salary for Gov. Ogilvie of the fall.

Ald. Sweeney announced that if the council would consent to let the street railway have five-foot sidewalks, the company would start at once at laying new tracks on James-street. No action was taken.

Ald. Sweeney opposed a grant of \$125 as the city's share of the expenses incurred by the Niagara Power Union, but nobody else did.

The coroner's jury that investigated the death of Henry Nicholson, a city employe killed by a falling limb on North Queen-street on Nov. 2, brought in an open verdict this evening.

Ordered to Leave City.

Wife No. 1 forgave him, and said she wanted him to support her.

On the old charge of harboring a politician, Jacob Obermayer, a hotelkeeper, will face Magistrate Jelfs Friday morning. The officer in question is Constable Thompson. It is alleged that Sergt. Finch saw him disappearing into the hotel after hours, and had the door slammed in his face when he tried to follow the policeman into the hotel. The constable will have to face the commissioners.

ONE YELLOW IMMIGRANT TO EVERY FOUR WHITES

Western Peril Described by Rev. C. K. Morse at Women's Baptist Mission Convention.

In addressing the Baptist Women's Home Mission convention at Bloor-street Church last night, Rev. C. K. Morse, general missionary for Manitoba, said he brought greetings from 12,000 Baptists in 200 churches scattered over the entire province. While they were thankful for the \$2200 sent to aid their home mission work, they were even more so for the spirit which prompted this substantial aid towards reaching the lands of Western Canada.

The work is far from fully covered. In Winnipeg, with 10,000 Jews, there is no mission to them for which any one church is responsible. Farther west, in British Columbia, the problem of Christianizing the foreign immigrants is even more difficult as there there was one yellow man for every four English-speaking settlers.

Mrs. C. I. Holman presided. Miss Marian Buchan reported that \$3323.69 had been raised, leaving a balance of \$718.

Miss L. Edith Stark, corresponding secretary, reported mission work among foreign settlers, and Indians in North Ontario. At Lake of the Woods, Mr. and Mrs. Harber are learning the Ojibway to enable them to teach in that language.

In Quebec City a Baptist chapel for French converts is to be dedicated next Sunday.

Rev. Jesse Gibson addressed the convention on "The Ministry of Intercession."

Rev. Dr. Gilmore of McMaster University spoke on the present problem in Central Canada. He said that it was increasingly that of carrying the gospel into the hearts of the people irrespective of race. It must be done by each worker for missions doing his full individual duty, just as the members of the British army from private to general work in perfect union.

The Women's Baptist Mission Board will meet to-day to make appropriations for the home and foreign work for the ensuing year.
