CHINESE AT HARBIN OPPOSE BOLSHEVIKI

Railway Employes' Union Objects to Seizure of Town by Soldiers' Council

Peking, Saturday, Dec 8-The council Harbir, Manchuria, on the trans-Siberian Railway line, have received telegrams from Nikola Lenine, the Bolsheviki premier in Petrograd, ordering the council to assume control of the town, the railway and the Russian customs of the Manchurian frontiers.

The Chinese Eastern Railways Employes' Union has protested against this action as bringing in foreign interference. The railway men express their determination to support Lieut. General Horvath the Russian military commander at Harbin, stating that it is impossible for either the fereign authorities or the local social organizations to recognize the Botheviki rule.


