Owners of Tracks in Montreal Are Getting Together for Their Mutual Benefit.

MONTREAL. April 5 .- During the past ew days the formation of a governing body of thorobred racing in the Province of Quebec has been liberally discussed Within a few days a meeting of the owners of the various tracks, with the exers of the various tracks, with the exception of Blue Bonnets, will be held when the proposition will be brought to an issue. Such a governing body would be the best thing that could happen to racing in this province, where there is so much of it held annually each season. With the announcement of dates from six clubs to be operated in Montreal next season there is an assurance of 84 days' racing, and under such a body as that proposed, racing would prosper and would remain in a healthier condition. The new governing body would be operwould remain in a healthier condition. The new governing body would be operated much on the same lines as the Canadian Racing Associations and would embody all of the half-mile tracks, Mount Royal and perhaps Dorval.

Under such conditions boys who were ruled off for incompetency at one track would not be allowed to ride at another until the ban was lifted by the officials who suspended them. This would also hold the owners and trainers in better control, and would force them to take out a license which would be revoked for misbehavior, and this would prevent them from racing at any track under the jurisdiction of the association.
